From the Chair...

It is refreshing to be able to talk about upcoming dancing events that we are planning, albeit with a healthy abundance of caution. After almost two years of no face-to-face dancing it has been a long wait. Our earlier plans of dancing in person in January were dashed by a tidal wave of COVID-19 cases and the

subsequent government restrictions put in place to keep us safe. Some of

those restrictions were lifted on January 31. According to the Ontario restart plan, additional restrictions will be lifted on February 21, and on March 14. At the moment, not only does it feel like we are seeing light at the end of the tunnel, but it also feels very much like we are emerging from the COVID-19 tunnel altogether. Hurray!

Effective January 31, 2022, Ontario cautiously lifted certain public health measures to reopen safely. Within this legislation, facilities used for indoor and out-door sports and recreational fitness activities are permitted to be open and are exempt from physical distancing requirements. This means we are able to restart Scottish country dancing activities, while still following all of the provincial and Toronto Public Health guidelines. Masks must still be worn, and proof of vaccination is required.

We are proceeding with plans for the remainder of this dancing season. We have scheduled Association dance classes and have planned a number of social dances in March and April. Details for these events and others will be posted as they are finalized. Dancing in the Park is planned to follow in June. It will be very nice to get back to dancing.

I am certain it will feel strange for many of us returning to dancing in person after a two-year hiatus. We will see how these events work out. Although we are allowed to run events, there may be some hesitancy to attend. This reticence is understandable. I encourage you to attend our events only when you are comfortable returning to in-person dancing where physical distancing is not required. I hope to see you on the dance floor in the not-too-distant future.

We are not out of the woods yet - The Toronto Association continues to be very cautious as we move forward with in-person dancing. Given our cautious approach...

Proof of Vaccination for March 12 – We require proof of vaccination (to include booster shot), together with mask wearing, and social distancing. Either bring a hard copy receipt showing two doses and a booster, or show proof on your cell phone. Receipts (both hard copy and cell phone) must show a QR code and details of 3 shots. Eastminster Church COVID-19 protocols also apply, i.e., capacity limits, safety plans, hand sanitizing, and a contact tracing log of attendees. We have set a limit of 68 dancers for this event. Please bring your own mask and water (no food).

COVID-19 Attestation Form – A signed attestation is required of all attendees. Download: COVID Attestation Form Please sign and, prior to March 10 (March 12 event), email: kevinmoloney@sympatico.ca or bring a completed copy on the night.

Pre-register in advance: March 12 and, separately, April 2nd Pre-registration for the March 12 dance closes March 7, 2022. Members not pre-registered, or not having valid vaccination certificates, will not be allowed into the event.

*Payment – Please pay by cheque (preferably) or cash at the door. Cheques are payable to RSCDS Toronto. If paying by cash, please have the exact amount. Coins will not be accepted. This will speed the sign-in process and help with social distancing.

There is Green P parking one block west of the church on Danforth Avenue – (Playter Blvd & Danforth), and near the TTC station on Broadview near Danforth (parking entrance is on Erindale Avenue, east from Broadview, immediately north of the TTC Broadview station). Street parking is also available.

The closest subway is Chester Station on Line 2 (Bloor/Danforth).

Teachers' Pet Dances: Arlene Koteff



What a challenge to pick the Five Fave! If you'd asked me this 30 years ago, it would have been easier: I knew fewer dances, there were fewer dances, and I seemed to favour fast dances over strathspeys. Because I'm very forward-thinking and open-minded, I also surmise that my next favourite dance is just

waiting for me to discover or is yet to be devised. Because of the delight dancing brings, on most given days my favourite dance is the one I am dancing at present.

For me, the choice cannot be based on the dance formations alone — the music is integral, as is flow, the connection between the formations and with other dancers, those magical moments when you catch your fellow dancers' eyes as you pass, the patterns traced on the floor, the covering, and the sheer joy the dance brings. So, even though there are newer dances that are brilliantly devised, if I've only danced them a few times, I have to be brutal and leave them off the list. The dance has to stand the test of time — it has to have legs, so to speak.

Pondering... if I were marooned on a desert island (feels like we're doing that now, with worse weather), could I dance the dance repeatedly? (On sand?!) So, here they are: Flowers of Edinburgh [R8x32, Trad., Book 1]

Talk about legs! The music is fabulous. You can (horrors!) dance the Australian version or add other flourishes to keep it fresh. *Mairi's Wedding* [R8x40, James B Cosh, 22 SCDs] Great music, history, song, the flow of the reels, the opportunity to curve into the reels of three across from certain positions. **Bonnie Stronshiray** [S8x32, RM Campbell, Glasgow Assembly] but only to Bobby Brown's music from Ready...And! That track drives the dance from the very first note. Positively exhilarating! Minister on the Loch [S3x32, Roy Goldring, 24 Graded & Social] Again, the music, the story, the grace and elegance of the dance that are reminiscent of skating. Every formation fits and offers connection, covering, and symmetry. Then there are the wee 'moments' in the dance: the birl for first woman at the end of Bar 16 to face up for the double figures of eight, and the delicate foot change as third woman becomes second woman to begin the all-round poussette.

So, if you're counting, you can see you are only getting the Fab Four. You know there are only four Beatles, so I stop here.

Fortunately, with the travel restrictions, I am not likely to be stuck on an island anytime soon, so I can dance away to the mammoth number of other favourites. Isn't Scottish country dancing just the best!

Teachers' Pet Dances: May Divers



I have lots of favourite dances, but I've chosen those that have real meaning behind them for me. The Machine Without Horses [J8x32, Rutherford, Book 12] This is my first favourite dance, and the first dance I was ever taught. I had been chosen, with eight other girls (no boys), to compete against other schools in our Glasgow

area. Our school came first, so you can imagine how proud our teacher and team were to be taking the Shield home to our school. I just love this dance because I am taken right back to those early days, and it is such a lively dance, with great music. Sir James Baird's Strathspey [S8x32, RM Campbell, Farewell My Fancy] This is my second choice. I just like the dance, the different figures, and the music*. It's not danced often, and I always wonder... Why not?

Langholm Fair [S3x32, Jean Attwood, Alexander Book 3] This is an interesting dance, and I especially love the story behind it. By old Scottish tradition, a couple could be betrothed, and live together. If after a year or two, things did not work out, or you did not get along, you could separate, even if you had children; and that was that. In the dance, the couple are metaphorically tied together at the wrist, and stay together most of the dance, until the end, when they separate. Not a fancy dance, but the story makes it fun.

<u>St. Andrew's of Brampton</u> [R4x32, Ann Campbell, Book 37] Unlike most dances, every figure is used well in the dance. It tells a good story, and I do like the devisor, Ann Campbell. Autumn in Appin — [S4x32, John Drewry, RSCDS Book 31] Such an interesting dance, and the music is beautiful[‡]. The different figures keep you thinking. It is a dance I like to do well and be in sync with the other dancers.



Shake up St Patrick's Day with a Lime *Roaring Jelly* Sandwich

[An intriguing recipe from Maclean's Magazine, 1937] Prepare lime jelly according to package directions. Pour half the quantity into a small, straight-sided tin (square or triangular) and allow to set firmly. Cover the surface of the jelly with a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch layer of cream cheese blended with a little mayonnaise. Pour the remaining half of the jelly (which has been allowed to cool but not set) over the cheese mixture. When chilled and set: turn out, and with a knife dipped in hot water, cut into small triangles. Serve each on crisp lettuce leaf with mayonnaise, as novel individual salads.

Selecting three dances for Book 53



The Society is planning to mark its centenary in 2023 by publishing *Book 53*, comprised of dances submitted by branches from around the world. Because of tight timelines and the preference for dances that had been published and danced locally, the approach had to be somewhat different from previous books.

To this end, the TA Board asked me to form a

selection committee of teachers and experienced dancers. The committee comprised Arlene Koteff, Maureen Richardson, Jane Robinson, and Theresa Malek.

The committee was tasked with selecting three locally-devised dances — a jig, a reel, and a strathspey — to submit to Scotland.

Our first task was to generate a list of dances that met the criteria. We created our list through suggestions from the Toronto membership, and a thorough review of 10 years of local dance programs. When we were done, we had a long list of, believe it or not, 53 dances to consider.

The large number of excellent dances from which to choose made this a challenging task. We evaluated the dances according to the guidelines set out by Headquarters and considered dance flow, transitions, difficulty level, symmetry, formations, the dance's overall "picture", as well as the story of the dance and its Toronto connections. We also considered the key role that music plays in the enjoyment of dances, along with the associated knotty issues of permissions and copyright.

In the end, the committee's consensus was to submit the following three dances along with each one's suggested music:

- <u>A Trip to Crinan</u> (J8x32) devised by Mairi and Andrew Collins
- The Peat Road (R8x32) devised by Deirdre MacCuish Bark
- <u>Michelle dePledge of Preston</u> (S8x32) devised by Barbara Taylor *Michelle dePledge of Preston* will be submitted with the original tune composed by Laird Brown for his wife. This emphasizes

Toronto's talent and further strengthens the story and local connection.

It will be an honour if Toronto is represented in *Book 53*, and the committee believes these three dances are worthy contenders.

The Toronto Association *Book 53* Committee thanks the Board for its confidence in our judgment, all the great dance devisors from the GTA, and all the members who contributed suggestions.

Taking hands on the side, SET, then CROSS RH to own side

While 1M+2M+3M SET, CROSS RH & 3M followed by 2M+1M CHASE C'W 1/2 way round to own side. (order 3,2,1)

- 9-12 3s, NHJ, DANCE DN btw 2s & 1s, CAST up to 2nd pl (2s step up #11-12)
- 13-16 1s, NHJ, DANCE up btw 3s+2s, & CAST off to 2nd pl (3s step dn #15-16)
- 17-24 1s CROSS RH, CAST round person on the right, approach each other in the middle, TURN RH to finish 2nd place own side
- 25-32 2s+1s+3s CIRCLE 6 hands round & back.
- NB: 2nd time through, 1s TURN RH #21-24 moving dn as they TURN to 4th place (4s step up #23-24)

Royal Scottish Country Dance Society Scholarships:

Applications for Scholarships for the 2022 Summer School are open! *Deadline:* Ideally, all applications should be in by March 18, 2022.

The RSCDS offers generous scholarships to provide assistance, particularly from the Derek & Maureen Haynes Memorial Fund, for young dancers and musicians to attend St Andrews Summer School. Note: Many of the scholarships for dancers and teaching certificate candidates attending Summer School are reserved for young people aged 35 and under. info & how to apply.

Various scholarships are offered to dancers to help cover the cost of residential and course fees at Summer School, whether attending the teacher-training classes or to participate in one of the three weeks full of dance classes.

Travel expenses are not typically covered; however, the **RSCDS** International Branch's Susi Mayr Fund offers grants that may cover travel; the Fund's purposes are much wider, and dancers are recommended to investigate it. <u>IB website</u>

Dance Etiquette: •An implied promise of social success and instant gentility•*

It's been a long, long time since many of us have put on our dancing shoes and joined fellow (rather than phantom) dancers on the dance floor. One dancer wrote: "SCD is now a distant memory. Will my brain and body remember?" So, in case we need reminding, here are a few points of dance etiquette that should always be observed:

- Form sets after the MC has announced the dance.
- Take your place in the sets at the end of the line as it is formed. Never leave to form a different set or to join a different set. Remain in the set until the dance has finished.
- The first man or the top couple in each row are responsible for counting off the sets.
- Count down the middle in a reasonably loud voice so that dancers on both sides of the set can hear clearly. Remember, stand on the men's side if your partner is late coming into line.
- Try to dance with different partners and make new friends.
- Listen quietly when a dance is briefed.
- Helping a new dancer does not mean pushing and pulling. If a dancer needs help, leave it to their partner or one other experienced dancer in the set. Seven people talking at once is CONFUSING! Often all that's needed is an indication by hand and the dancer can follow where to go.
- If things go astray, and they will, remember it's okay to make mistakes. Keep it fun.
- At the end of the dance, thank your partner and the dancers in your set.
- Clear the dance floor once the dance finishes.

FINANCIAL MOTIONS

At the 2021 RSCDS AGM in Perth, the Society agreed to a fee increase of £5 for the upcoming year. At our AGM in April 2006, a motion was passed that any fee increases from the Society would automatically be passed on to Toronto Association members. As there has been very little activity for the past two years and we are working to retain and attract new members, it was felt that this was not the time to increase our membership fees. The Toronto Association has sufficient reserve funds to absorb the increase in the short term.

The Board moves that with regards to the Society fee increase for 2022, we waive the RSCDS Toronto Association 2006 motion to automatically pass on fee increases from the Society to our members, for the 2022-23 dancing year.

The Board moves that the financial engagement for the 2022 fiscal year be a compilation engagement.

During the pandemic the government gave permission to corporations to meet electronically. The new legislation (ONCA – Ontario Not for Profit Corporations Act) which came into force in October allows corporations to continue to meet this way, provided it is in their bylaws. Proposed changes to the wording in our by-laws and procedures are in **bold**.

Be it moved that articles 3.4 and 6.5 of the By-laws be amended to say:

- 3.4 Quorum and Meeting A quorum for the transaction of business shall be five (5) Directors including at least one (1) of either the Chair or Vice-Chair. Except as otherwise required by law, the Board may hold its meetings at the Head Office of the Corporation or at any such place or places, **or electronically**, as it may, from time to time, determine.
- 6.5 Annual and other Meetings of Members The Annual or any other General Meeting of the Members shall be held at the Head Office of the Corporation or elsewhere in the Province of Ontario, **or electronically**, as the Board may determine and on such day as the Board shall appoint.

Be it moved that article 6.7.4 of the Procedures be amended to say:

6.7.4 The Executive Committee may meet by conference call **or other electronic means**. Officers who participate in this call are considered present for the meeting.

The following changes are being proposed in order to have more flexibility with the publishing of motions. Members are requested to get any proposed motions to the Secretary before the February Board meeting – the February Board meeting is after the publication of the February newsletter. The motions need to be shared with members at least 60 days before the meeting, the March newsletter would be too late. Should any motions be sent by members, if we could put them in the February eNotes it still fulfills the mandate of being published at least 60 days before the AGM.

 - iv. motions to adjust membership fees approved by the Board in accordance with Article 3.6.1 of the Procedures Manual;
 - v. other motions as put forward either by the membership that are supported by ten (10) full members of RSDCS TA, or by the Board as sanctioned by an affirmative vote of a majority of Directors.
- 5.1.3 The Secretary of the Board shall advise all Full Members at least two (2) weeks in advance of the Annual General Meeting date and of motions to be addressed by publishing them in the Association's newsletter **and/or electronically directly to members** and **on the** website.
