In December, Ron and I were taught this warm Maori greeting of New Zealand's North Island. December begins New Zealand summers. In Auckland, temperatures were pleasant but in Dunedin, near the southeast end of South Island, the weather was changeable, cold, and brisk. On the South Pacific side, the Otago Peninsula is home to Yellow-Eyed Penguins, nesting Royal Albatross, Hooker Sea Lions, and Sea Elephants. The only land south of New Zealand is Antarctica. The weather suddenly made sense.

The New Zealand Branch (all of New Zealand is one RSCDS Branch) celebrated its 50th nationally organized Summer School in December, attracting a record 300 dancers from all parts of the dancing world.

Dunedin, settled in 1848 by Scottish immigrants, is a Scottish coastal town, boasting a statue of Robert Burns guarding the "Octagon" and a number of architecturally interesting Victorian and Edwardian stone buildings. Summer School was centered at Knox College, an imposing Victorian building, originally a theological college now part of University of Otago. It is surrounded by beautiful Botanic Gardens with spectacular roses and many familiar perennials. The Cabbage trees and giant flax plants provide clues that this is not

Dunedin is hilly. Classes were held at different locations, requiring climbing steep hills. Baldwin Street, the steepest street in the world (Guinness Book of World Records), was only two streets from the hall where Ron and I attended daily. With Evelyn and John Holmberg, we did climb it! With three-hour morning classes, optional classes, mock court, trips, afternoon golf, three social dances, three balls and a ceilidh in the evenings, and much walking and socializing, we all became very fit!

Among the Canadians present, seven couples from the Toronto area met at Summer School and made our presence felt. One couple brought a full-sized Canadian flag, courtesy of their local MP, and managed to persuade the College staff to fly it. For one full day—New Year's Eve—it flew proudly from the Knox flagpole.

The Royal Deeside Railway What's in a name?

The magnificent "Silver Dee" is one of Scotland's most prolific salmon-fishing rivers. It flows 150 km from the Cairngorms until it reaches the North Sea at Aberdeen. Its scenic valley became a favourite of Queen Victoria, hence the expression "Royal Deeside".



Following the royal purchase of the Balmoral Estate in the 1840s and the erection of a new castle, a railway line was developed to run along the river valley from Aberdeen to Ballater. Its completion in 1866 provided Victoria with easy access to her estate, as Ballater was just a short coach ride from Balmoral. For the following hundred years, to take The Royal Deeside Railway was also a popular sight-seeing trip, until it was closed down unceremoniously by British Railways in 1966.

Steam-railway enthusiasts have since redeveloped some short sections of track and refurbished the old station at Ballater as a Visitor Centre. In 1999, RSCDS Book 40 included a lovely, flowing 32-bar reel called *The Royal Deeside Railway* to celebrate this piece of Victorian history. Barry Pipes

West End Workshop

Tn 1984, Doug Stephen (Erin Mills) Land Jess Bryden (Bloorlea) envisioned the creation of a West End Workshop to be held in spring 1985. Beginner and Intermediate classes were to be taught by Jess Bryden, Wes Clindinning and Jean Hamilton; music by Stan Hamilton.

We offered coffee and doughnuts, a hearty lunch, and evening dance, for less than \$10. Innovation was the key to early success. Soup was made from packets, fresh vegetables were added and it was served as "home made." The marvellous "drink machine," thanks to Bruce Murdoch, produced an everlasting flow of soft drinks to quench the thirsty dancers.

When we moved to Streetsville Secondary in 1987, the larger space allowed us to grow and to improve our already high standards. Wealthier now, we could have teachers from abroad and musicians for all classes and the evening dance.

This event has surpassed our wildest expectations, becoming the "workshop to attend," thanks to the hard work and dedication of the "Few." We saw this as an opportunity to give something back to an activity that gave so much to us.

The fact that our workshop is very much alive after more than two decades speaks for itself. We filled a void, while establishing an identity for the West End and Erin Mills dancers.

The tradition continues, Saturday, March 24, this year at Fletcher's Meadow Public School, Brampton (see page 4).


