St. Clement's Scottish Country Dancers

Grace Harris received her Full Certificate in 1969 from Miss Milligan and Miss MacLaren. She danced at Calvin and she took her own children to Rosedale to join the children's class. She also organized the MacLeod Demonstration Team, composed principally of Scottish Dance teachers.

Grace was a trained soprano. She sang in the Scarborough Bach Choir and in 1964 joined the Orpheus Choir, then under director John Sidgwick, Organist of St. Clement's Anglican Church. Also at St. Clement's was Rev. Dr. John Hurd, New Testament professor at Trinity College

(and founder of the Trinity SCD group). Dr. Hurd invited Grace to establish a class of Scottish Country dancers at St. Clement's in 1971 – an idea heartily approved by Rector, Canon Duncan Abraham, who granted permission to use spacious Canon Nicholson Hall.

The Saturday morning class for youngsters at St. Clement's began, modestly, with twelve beginners. Those were Halcyon days for Scottish Country dancing in Toronto and with Grace's deft teaching, the class soon grew. At its peak, there were over 170 young dancers (21 sets).

St. Clement's dancers participated in Toronto and Hamilton festivals, demonstrated at Caravan, Cody Hall, and the Odeon Theatre, and they participated in children's festivals and competitions. Competition was fierce but, over the years, they won every trophy offered. The trophy most cherished by Grace is the Anderson Quaich, for the Best Danced Strathspey Performed By 17 & 18-Year-Olds. Grace also taught dance to girls at Havergal College in Toronto and others in Vancouver.

Her most rewarding teaching experience was seeing teenagers, without being prompted, ask other teens to join them in the dance. "That was truly rewarding, for they were 'getting it' [dancing]." Her advice to dancers is "Don't think what you can get out of it. Look at your partner. Have fun! As long as people are having fun, dancing will continue."

With the decline in British immigration, St. Clement's, like other groups, suffered declining numbers. The children's group faded away but a small Monday evening adult class continued, including a dancer with Grace since she was wee. After so many years of teaching, Grace and husband Colin, who always handled the music, were looking to retire – but who could take over and carry on the St. Clement's SCD tradition?

While leading a St. Andrew's Ball practice, Grace noticed a young lady who, though exuberant, was a listener. . . someone who wanted to know how to do things right. The lady was Teresa Kowalczyk (now Lockhart) [▶ See St. Clement's Continues. . . pg 2]

and at the time she was helping Lorna Larmour and Moira Korus teach youngsters Saturday mornings at Rosedale – and working towards her Full Certificate (awarded 2007).

At Grace's request, in 2005 Teresa started teaching at St. Clement's, as Grace gradually withdrew. Teresa was readily accepted by the group and since 2006, Grace and Colin have relished their Monday evenings at home.

Teresa instituted a Beginners' Technique class at 6:30, followed by the Social Group class at 7:15. Typically, there are two to four sets of mixed-level dancers on Mondays in the compact Old Parish Hall, adjacent to Canon Nicholson Hall where St. Clement's Scottish Country dancing began nearly 40 years ago.

When the great snows of the past winter caused cancellation of the March Monthly Dance, thus denying Beginners their night to shine, Teresa took a risk. . . she rented a large gym at Bishop Strachan School (BSS) and invited beginners to come enjoy the dances they'd been practicing. It was a grand evening – over eight sets – with lots of strong dancers to guide newbies, and folk brought great treats for the interval.

Thus, St. Clement's SCD group continues to thrive, as does St. Clement's Anglican Church. However, the church has extensive renovation plans that will soon eliminate the Old Parish Hall as a viable dance venue. Therefore, beginning September 15th, St. Clement's dancers, with teacher Teresa Lockhart, will meet at 6:30 each Monday evening in the lovely, spacious, wooden-floored Great Hall of Bishop Strachan School in Forest Hill.

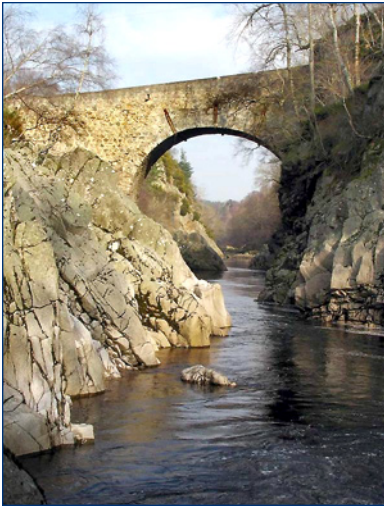

Dulsie Bridge, spans the Findhorn River near the seaside town of Nairn. It's 60 ft from the bridge walk to the water – and adventurous folk like to jump off (for fun!). If you're not queasy about heights, go to YouTube and search for "Dulsie Bridge".

WHAT'S IN A NAME? *The Bridge of Nairn*

It was King James VI of Scotland who boasted around the year 1603 that Nairn was a town in this kingdom whose only street was so long that people living at one end could not understand the language of the people at the other end... Gaelic to the east and the local Scots dialect to the west.

As an ancient fishing port on the Moray Firth, just a short distance east of Inverness, Nairn also became a Victorian seaside resort in the 1860s. This was due supposedly to its relatively mild climate! Moreover, Nairn's proximity to both the Culloden battlefield and Cawdor Castle of Shakespeare's Macbeth fame, likely helps its standing as a tourist centre. One famous visitor was said to be the Duke of Cumberland (the "Butcher" of Culloden), who commanded the English troops in Scotland in 1746. He stayed at Nairn just prior to the unpleasantness at Culloden and was responsible for the brutal treatment of Jacobite survivors.

But the bridge? While there are one or two town bridges over the River Nairn, seemingly not of historical consequence, there is a well-known bridge in Nairnshire just south of the town that might well be significant enough to justify becoming the name of a dance. It is the picturesque Dulsie Bridge that carries an old 18th century military road over the River Findhorn. This is most likely the *Bridge of Nairn* that we know as an RSCDS strathspey, a dance that first surfaced in 1945 (Book 13 - *The Victory Book*).

- Scottish Country Dancers, the 48th Highlanders Pipe Band and Highland Dancers will march onto the outfield at precisely 6.30 p.m. Carole Skinner is choreographing the whole 15 minute programme to give the three groups involved equal opportunity to present their talents and create an impressive show. 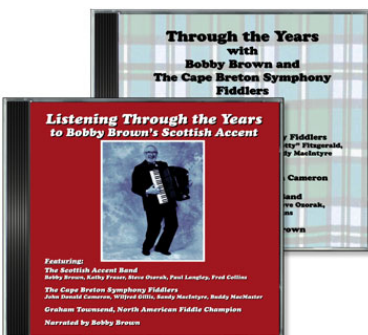
Membership: Renew Now

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Outreach: 2007-08

The Director of Communication's Report

Presented by Carole Bell at the Annual General Meeting: April 26, 2008

Our membership is dwindling to a critical stage and volunteers, in order to attract new members, have been working hard to increase awareness that the Scottish Country Dance community is alive and well in the GTA.

SCD not only has a 50-year history in Toronto but is also a particularly relevant activity in the 21st century for both children and adults of all ages who want to combine fun, fitness, and friendship. That the Toronto Association is a vibrant community for them to join is a tremendous asset.

An outreach Ways and Means Committee (Ken Adamson, Paul Barber, Ron Bell, Norma Lumsden, Kim Malcolmson, and Carolyn Watt) met earlier in the year to discuss current outreach and possible expansion. I am pleased to report:

1. We have been contacting new Dance and Fitness magazines about SCD promotion and encouraging community newspapers to send photographers to our events.
2. We placed advertisements in Toronto Life and SNAP newspapers.
3. Our webmaster keeps our website interesting, attractive, and informative to non-dancers as well as members.
4. One of our young dancers is part of a dance group on Facebook and promotes SCD.
5. We have contacted the Toronto Business Improvement Areas and city councillors about demonstration opportunities when planning festivals, sidewalk sales, etc.
6. We maintain a central phone line that is key in promoting beginner classes.
7. We are drafting a dance shirt logo explaining to non-dancers what we are about.
8. We distributed flyers to spectators at the Tartan and St. Andrew's balls and at the Granite Club Burns Evening where teacher David Booz introduced non-dancers to the joys of Ceilidh dancing.
9. That evening was so successful that we will hold our own Ceilidh for non-dancers on October 24. (See page 2)
10. CBC contacted us in January and organized an SCD dance segment for the daily community program Living in Toronto. This segment has been repeated and is also linked to our website.
11. We seek professional and interest groups to contact about SCD. So far we have published an article in the Bruce Trail magazine and are preparing one for the Scottish Studies magazine.
12. On July 8, we will participate in Scottish Heritage Night at a Blue Jays game. Whatever your interest in baseball, please come out to participate and promote SCD.
13. Dancing in the Park has always been an important Branch activity. This year dancers from Don Mills and Hillcrest will distribute flyers in their local area to promote the event. New promotional banners will be fixed to the Edwards Gardens railings on Lawrence and on Leslie on the day of the event.

Finally, increasing awareness of Scottish Country Dancing, and therefore membership, will continue to be of the utmost importance in coming years.

I ask all members to provide more ideas and contacts to me, so that the Communications Committee can confidently report an expanding range of projects at the 2009 AGM.

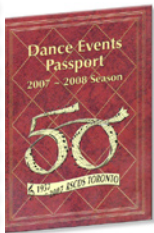
