The Countess of Dunmore's Reel: 32 bar Reel for 3 couples in 4 couple set

- 1-2 1st couple set:
- 3-6 Giving nearer hands, dance down between 3^{rd} couple and cast to 2^{nd} place on own sides. 2^{nd} couple step up on bars 3&4.
- 7-8 1st couple set advancing to face 1st corners.
- 9-16 1st couple turn 1st corner with right hand, pass partner (up & down dance) by right shoulder. 1st couple turn 2nd corner by the right hand, pass partner right shoulder & face out in 2nd place on own sides of set.

17 – 24 Chaperoned Chain Progression:

Bars 1-2: As 1st couple cast to the right, 2s & 3s turn partners RH x3/4 to finish with all 3 couples in line along the centre of the set.

Bars 3-6: 1W with 3M & 1M with 2W take promenade hold & dance halfway round the outside of the set. At the same time 2M & 3W turn each other LH 1&1/2 to finish in each others places.

Bars 7-8: 1st couple release promenade hold & continue onto 2nd place own sides, facing clockwise. 1s & 3s: turn partner RH x3/4 and face clockwise.

Order: 3 1 2

- 25 28 3rd,1st & 2nd couples chase clockwise halfway round set to opposite sides.
- 2nd, 1st & 3rd couples with nearer hands joined, set to partner & cross to own sides giving right hands.
