From the Chair...



Welcome back to the dance and to 2017, after the celebrations of Christmas and Hogmanay. We were recently in Boston, England for a few days over Winter Solstice, where it was dark by mid-afternoon,

much earlier than here in Ontario. However, from now on, the days become longer as we look forward to Spring.

Cold days are with us now, and there is nothing better than a bowl of porridge to set one up for the day. Porridge was the backbone of the Scottish crofters' diet for centuries. My father told how a large pan was prepared each morning with water, oats and salt. Leftovers were poured into a wooden drawer and left to set. The set porridge would then be sliced and used for snacks during the day. I suspect my father and his siblings would have taken a slice of porridge to school for lunch. There were no school meals in those days in their small, Hebridean island school.

My sister and I had our porridge with milk and a dollop of golden syrup. Now mine is made with milk, and I see recipes including honey, cream and various fruits, nuts and seeds. The more the porridge is stirred, the creamier it becomes. Enjoy!

With most of the winter still to come, we enjoy a respite in January with celebrations of the life of Scottish poet Robert Burns. The demo pool dancers are performing in at least 14 events. Some of the social groups have their own demonstrations in January and many of us attend Burns Suppers and luncheons. Dancing helps to offset the effects of too much haggis, neeps and tatties — not to mention the single malt whisky needed for the various toasts!

Our premier event of the year, the Tartan Ball, is imminent. Now is the time to practise the dances. Practises for newer dancers begin late January at Broadlands CC, and several groups [see page 3] are running their own special Tartan Ball classes in February.

John Anderson Fraser, Guest of Honour at this year's Tartan Ball, is an internationally recognized Canadian journalist, novelist, drama and dance critic, and magazine editor. He comes with countless credentials in a myriad of fields, including finance.

He was appointed editor of Canada's oldest and most distinguished magazine, *Saturday Night*, in 1987, a position he held until 1995. He lectured at St. Michael's College on the history of Canadian newspapers, on Canadian studies at the University of Toronto's Innis College, and on drama criticism at York University. At the *Globe and Mail* he was dance critic, feature writer, and junior editor where he pioneered mixed circulation of *Saturday Night* inserted in the *Globe and Mail* and other newspapers.

Mr. Fraser was elected the fourth Master of Massey College, Toronto, a nineteen-year tenure from 1995 to 2014. Massey's first master was the redoubtable Robertson Davies, who established many of the customs and traditions of the college. By 1995 relative institutional poverty was threatening to be a college tradition. However, under Mr. Fraser's management, the endowment fund at Massey College increased from \$5.2 million to \$22 million when he left the college in the capable hands of former Senator Hugh Segal. His crowning glory at Massey College was his creation of the Quadrangle Society—"a link between the outside world and the academic community, working both ways—town and gown".

Dance has decorated his career. His first book, *Kain and Augustyn*, is an account of two leading dancers of the National Ballet of Canada, Karen Kain and Frank Augustyn. In 1974, he became intricately involved by playing a key role in orchestrating the dramatic defection of Mikhail Baryshnikov, the 28year-old Latvian-born leading dancer of the Kirov Ballet who was performing at the O'Keefe Centre.

After receiving an urgent call from New York, Mr. Fraser delivered a coded message and telephone number to Baryshnikov at a post-performance reception, escaping the careful attention of Baryshnikov's Soviet watchers.

Since Fraser did not speak Russian and Baryshnikov did not speak English, they communicated in French. On June 29, 1974, Baryshnikov, accompanied by a group of supporters and lawyer Jim Peterson, escaped through a back door of the O'Keefe Centre. [Continued on page 3: Guest of Honour]

Subsequently, Mr. Fraser wrote the first interview with the dancer in the west, and *Private View: Inside Baryshnikov's American Ballet Theatre* was critically acclaimed in Canada, United States, and Britain.

In June, 2014, Baryshnikov attended a ceremony and dinner at Massey College celebrating Mr. Fraser's years of service. "Oh, how could I not

come? John Fraser and Jim Peterson are two of my best friends," he said.



In *The Secret of the Crown: Canada's Affair with Royalty* Fraser argues that the Crown is "the magic, the mystery, and the stabilizing civil solution to our treacherous political propensities". The Queen honoured him twice: with the Silver Jubilee Medal in 1977 and the Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002, the same year he received the Order of Canada. He has a ready wit, impeccable timing, respect for our Royal Patron, who is defender of the faith. He has even dared to add his own individual endings to scripture readings in public!

International intrigue and monarchical allegiances aside, John Fraser's curiosity on more than one occasion led him from Massey College to scrutinize local joviality in nearby Cartwright Hall at St. Hilda's College where Trinity Scottish dancers were celebrating Hallowe'en or Robbie Burns Day. He had to investigate what impish mischief he might be missing!

One of John's favourite quotes is from Abraham Rotstein: "You have to run very fast to stay in the same place," and there is a parallel to what he told me is his favourite dance, *The Gay Gordons*, where dancers take four steps forward, four backward, and then waltz essentially in the same place. Won't you join the dance, John? *Donald E Holmes*


