Arthur MacRae is a Montrealer, married to Judith Watkins, a

long-time parishioner of St. Clement's Church, Toronto. He was educated at Ashbury College, McGill (BA and STM), Trinity (STB), and the University of Toronto (MA). He also graduated from the Ontario College of Education, and the Canadian Armed Forces Militia Command and Staff Course. He was ordained deacon (in the Church of England in Canada) in 1955 and priest (in the Anglican Church of Canada) in 1956. After a curacy in Montreal, he founded St. James the Apostle, Brampton, and St. Joseph of Nazareth, Bramalea. Later he served in a number of parishes, in various capacities, joining St. Clement's as an Honorary Associate in January 1990.

He was coordinator of the North York Board of Education's Extended (Late Immersion) French programme. As a multilingual Certified Translator, translating from Italian, French, Spanish, and Portuguese to English, he has been Chair of the Canadian Translators' and Interpreters' Council and he translated the Book of Common Prayer into Papiamentu, a two-year project. [Papiamentu is a Spanish Creole language with admixtures of Portuguese and Dutch, spoken on the Caribbean islands of Aruba, Bonaire, and Curaçao.] MacRae said he undertook that translation for three reasons: "The people were dissatisfied with the American version of the Book of Common Prayer, I can speak Spanish, and I certainly know liturgy."

As a military chaplain in charge of 36 Protestant chaplains, he became Area Chaplain (senior reserve chaplain) for Ontario and helped to form the relationship between the 7th Toronto Regiment RCA and St. Clement's Church, Toronto. He was also involved with the Lorne Scots of Brampton, and the Victoria Rifles.

When he is not worshipping at St. Clement's, Arthur does crosswords and reads mystery  $% \left\{ 1,2,...,n\right\}$ 

novels, especially those of Peter May, a Scottish novelist, whose work, *The Lewis Trilogy*, is set in the outer Hebrides. Judith favours the Brontës, and moor walking.

Arthur and Judith have sailed around Scotland twice on the *Queen Elizabeth*. Loyal to our Royal Patron, HM Queen Elizabeth, Judith was Toronto Chair of the Monarchist League of Canada in 2014. Arthur has been a member of the Monarchist League of Canada since 1981, and he can heartily greet you in Gaelic. ... Donald E. Holmes

Through one of Moira Korus' Youth dancers, I was invited to the Bayview Middle School/Avondale Elementary School to teach Scottish country dance to a group of grade 7 students who had signed up for the April 13 lunch-hour session. A class of grade 4 students also joined the fun. The grade 7 teacher, the Intermediate Art/Dance/Drama teacher, the grade 4 teacher, and I provided supervision and guidance. The group of 32-35 students was happy to complete *Virginia Reel* in the 30-minute period.

A follow-up email of appreciation invited me to teach five grade 8 classes for up to five lessons each. My calendar couldn't accommodate that but we worked out a compromise such that all classes had at least two sessions in their timetable. The lessons ran through to May 31, and an extra-curricular group continued until the last day of school.

The students were introduced to some history of Scottish country dance, the skip-change-of-step, and three dances – *Virginia Reel, The Dashing White Sergeant*, and *Domino Five*. A number of eager enthusiasts danced the reels of three, rather than a simpler figure of eight. They also got to perform for some of their peers.

It was, and always is, a pleasure to share what one loves with others. There are unexpected opportunities to share Scottish country dance with others of all ages — we must be open to the possibilities. In January, I taught one lesson to a class of grade 4 students at a school in Newmarket, as part of their study of Robert Burns. That contact was made through my local book club, via a retired principal who just happened to be close friends with the teacher of class.

Enjoy the dance season. I look forward to seeing you on the dance floor.

# Harris & the AGM: Smooth Sailing

From there we drove to Uig, on the Isle of Skye, to board the CalMac Ferry to Tarbert, on the Isle of Harris. It was a smooth crossing, though this time of year

In Tarbert, Keith and I again joined the energetic, fun group of Harris dancers at their weekly Ceilidh/Scottish dance class. We were asked to teach some dances and this year they requested step practice!

At the end of the week, we headed for Perth and the Society AGM, arriving in time

for the Friday night dance. This year they ran a ceilidh dance, also in the Bells Sports Centre, and we could switch between the two events. Saturday morning we attended the Open Forum, which covered the Convenor reports and feedback on the Business Plan. We then split up. Keith attended the New Website update (Anselm Lingnau), and I went to Education & Training on the New Teaching Qualification (Malcolm Brown).

At lunch, International Branch members met at the Copper Beech Cafe, in the Black Watch Museum. It's nice to meet friends there, and to make new friends. Just a soup and sandwich lunch with a glass of wine — and a lot of conversation.

The Annual General Meeting was the shortest since we began attending in 2001; only 47 minutes, with little discussion. The award of Society scrolls was moved to the pre-Ball Reception on Saturday evening and Convenor reports are now on the website, which saved a great deal of time. 

#### Scottish Step into the New Year


The first three Scottish Step Classes held at Rosedale

 ${\cal W}$  ith tongue thrust firmly into cheek, I'd like to bring to your attention a Scottish legend that the haggis

grows on trees. This being the month we celebrate Robbie Burns Day, and when that thing known as a haggis is addressed, we need to put to rest anyone's concerns about where a well-prepared haggis actually originates and what it contains.

It is said, and perhaps even believed by some, that haggis can be found growing on a rare type of Scottish tree. Should you be fortunate enough to come upon such a tree, and find a haggis or two that has ripened and fallen from said tree, then proceed as follows. Marinate the haggis with a generous supply of your favourite single malt Scotch and cook to taste. The result will be as fresh and flavourful a delicacy as you will ever have experienced.

As we now return to reality, setting legends aside, those of us who delight in our annual opportunity to savour a very tasty haggis more than likely know what it contains. We may even know what constitutes sheep's pluck, which of course covers the primary ingredients, by name: lamb's heart, liver, and lungs. As most of us well realize, the pluck is ground up with oatmeal, onion, suet, and spices, all compressed into a bladder that used to be made from the animal's stomach but now is likely to be an artificial facsimile.




There was an interesting snippet of news recently about a Scottish butcher, Macsween of Edinburgh, wanting to import haggises directly from Scotland into Canada. But there's a snag! Canadian Food Regulations forbid the importation of animal lungs for reasons too complex to be discussed here. So Macsween plans to adjust its haggis recipe, eliminating the lung component.

In the eyes of established Canadian haggis makers, this is too non-traditional and lacking in quality to be acceptable to Scottish-Canadians. One Toronto critic, Allen's Scottish Butchers on Weston Road, has been making haggis for over 40 years using home-grown ingredients including those important lungs. The owner, Steve Allen, who is a Liverpudlian by birth, believes that Canadian haggis eaters will recognize such a blatant shortcoming in the Macsween product. Stay tuned!

Back to the dance. John Drewry, perhaps also with tongue in cheek, devised *The Haggis Tree* as a strathspey, and published it in his *Autumn 83 Collection* some 30-odd years ago. It is especially interesting in that it contains a relatively uncommon formation called *La Baratte* (the churn), which adds to this strathspey quite distinctively. You have not heard of *La Baratte*? I recommend that you take a look at *The Haggis Tree* on YouTube. It is seen as danced in 2016 by the Humbercrest and Erin Mills groups at our last Gala Day.

In conclusion, two brevities for us haggis eaters to recognize are.....

- 1. Don't forget the neeps and tatties.



It was a genteel gesture of kindness for sure, just as Lieutenant Tobias George Smollett shook Robert Anderson by the hand, laughing heartily, and then desired a pinch of snuff, in token of perfect reconciliation\*:

If young X wad gi'him but a pinch o' snuff out o' his own mull, he wad think more of it than a' the siller.
