At Millennials' Classes, the hall is filled with positive energy and enthusiasm, with two sets each night. More than half the dancers are new to Scottish country dancing; others have varying ranges of experience. Teacher, Moira Korus, has inspired all to enjoy the dance and its benefits.

Dancers learned basic steps: slip-step, skip-change-of-step, pas-de-Basque, and strathspey travelling and setting steps. They've been quick to pick up formations, taught within the context of dances on the Family Christmas Dance: advance and retire, back-to-back, figures of eight, reels, hands across, allemande, circle round and back, rights-and-lefts, corners.

Some of the Millennials attended both the 1-hour Intro Class, taught by Teresa Lockhart at the Workshop, and the Tea Dance that followed. We expect to see many of the class at the December 14 Family Christmas Dance, this year at Branksome Hall.

Our third and final session introduced us to Colin Campbell, accompanied by Fred Moyes. Colin taught us a dance I had never done before, Ysobel Stewart of Fish Hoek, which features the Tourbillon. This is a surprisingly difficult formation as it requires both long and short strathspey steps at just the right moment. Colin did a superb job of explaining how to do it and then helping us to complete it ourselves.

Clear and concise instruction can be so helpful. Before the session was done, Colin had us dancing Lord MacDonald's Reel to one of Fred's own compositions, Draughty Breeks (trousers). This was Colin's first time teaching at a workshop, and he was very good. Congratulations!

How do I sum up the three sessions?

Perhaps Sprezzatura: "a certain nonchalance, so as to conceal all art and {make} whatever one says appear to be without effort and almost without any thought about it." All of our teachers reinforced this concept in their own way: strive to make each dance look simple, easy, and effortless...and sometimes we almost succeeded! It is always a wonderful day when we can spend time with friends and dance with so many new and familiar faces from all over Ontario and the US. 

Deirdre MacCuish Bark reports on The Autumn Gathering (the Society's AGM)

Keith and I enjoyed a week of sunshine in the Western Isles, then rain once we crossed the Skye Bridge and drove through Kyle of Lochalsh. Lunch at Bruar, and a wet drive to Perth, and the Society's AGM, now termed The Autumn Gathering.

Regretfully, we missed the Friday Teachers' Conference, but we made the Friday night dance to the music of James Coutts' Scottish Band. The programme was primarily from the new book, *Popular Dances: Volume 2*, launched at the AGM, with two CDs for the 30 dances: James Coutts' music for CD#1; previously published music from several bands for CD#2.

Open Forum: Saturday morning began in the Coaching Hall of the Bell Sports Centre. Chair Elect, Lorna Ogilvie, outlined the work to date of the 100th Centenary Working Group. The Society turns 100 in 2023, and the group is planning to celebrate in suitable style, and create a lasting legacy. The group has representation from Europe, Canada, USA, and New Zealand, plus members from RSCDS committees.

Centenary celebration suggestions had been collected worldwide, and we were divided into small groups to discuss the list and to agree/disagree with each suggestion. Our completed lists were handed in for further consideration. Some ideas need Branch cooperation. Ideas must be affordable, manageable, and ensure all members a chance to be involved.

Lorna informed us of two anniversaries of national interest coinciding with the RSCDS 100th: The Flying Scotsman train will mark 100 years in 2023, and it will also be 200 years since the death of Henry Raeburn, whose painting, *The Reverend Robert Walker Skating on Duddingston Loch*, is in the Scottish National Gallery in Edinburgh. These are both of wide interest and perhaps the RSCDS can use them too. The group Keith and I were in favoured making a video recording of dancing *The Minister on the Loch* at Toronto City Hall ice rink or the Rideau Canal in Ottawa.

The 2023 Autumn Gathering will be in Glasgow, where the first formative meeting of the Society was held in 1923, at the Athenaeum — a beautiful Art Deco building that is now a Hard Rock Café. It's suggested that on centenary day, a team should dance in there, as others dance outside in Buchanan Street.

2017-2020 Business Plan: Andrew Kellett (RSCDS Chair) presented. He said,

- 14 items have been completed, including:
- New website with improved content
- CTI (Core Training for Instructors), almost completed.
- More effective use of 12 Coates Crescent
- Financial incentive to Branches (two Branches founded, pending review of Management Committee Remits)

2020-2023 Business Plan:

- Get fit for the Centenary
- Branches to plan what they might do: Planning needs to start NOW!
- Strong Leadership
- Budget
- Ideas
- Enthusiasm

Membership Services Discussion: (led by Peter Knapman)

Mainly about results of a survey by the Membership Services Committee earlier this year. Only 18% of the members replied. Of those, 30% from Canada and US; 21% from Scotland. The 56 to 75 age group made 68% of replies, and 50% were from teachers (not all certificated).

- The majority of dancers who replied want new dance books 25% said every year; 34% opted for alternate years.
- Briefing/re-caps of dances are thought helpful (and now RSCDS policy)
- Being inclusive of ceilidh and reeler dances in dance programmes
- *Popular Dances, Vol 2* from Membership Services, includes information about the history of the dances, the devisors, and the music.
- In future, Membership Services intends to explore dances relating to Sir Walter Scott, dress in 19th century garb, and perform some of the dances at Abbotsford, Scott's home — something that might attract the attention of a wider public.

Also on Saturday morning: Deb Lees taught a dance class with music by Angela Young, and there was an Archive Display with archivist, Alan MacPherson. Keith and I met International Branch for lunch in the Black Watch Museum café — wine with soup and sandwiches and lots of talking! Then back to the AGM.



AGM Meeting: The AGM began at 2 p.m. and finished at 3:05. A short meeting this year! Keith and I represented eight Branches between us: Toronto, Ottawa, St Catharines, Kitchener/Waterloo, Kingston, London, Buffalo, and Hamilton.

The Society Scroll of Honour was awarded to three persons. Mervyn Short (UK), and Jim Stott (Aberdeen) were present to receive the award. Catherine Elliott Shaw of London (ON) Branch will formally receive hers at the London Christmas Dance, Nov. 30. Andrew Kellett reported that membership rose slightly this year. He asked that the

Branches respond to the Society's request for their financial reports. This gives the Society data on what each Branch does and what it achieves.

The motion to reduce the membership subscription fee by £2 to £18 was passed. The monies are to be retained by each Branch for use in advertising. One Branch was against the motion; they felt the money would be better spent by the Society. Andrew replied that the Society would run out of people before it ran out of money and people were more important. **Committee Elections:** Neither Management Board (with 4 spaces) nor Membership Services Committee (with 3 spaces) had anyone willing to serve on these committees, so they shall co-opt people later.

- EDUCATION & TRAINING: Six people put their names forward for the available 4 spaces on that committee. Elected were: Mervyn Short (Berks/Hants/Surrey Border), Deirdre MacCuish Bark* (Toronto), and Anne Robertson (Oban & Lorn/Glasgow), all for 3 years, and Chris Ronald (New York) for 1 year.
- YOUTH SERVICES: Three people for three positions. A vote decided which should be for 3 years and which for one year. Malin Altenmüller and Philippa McKee both 3 years, and Margaret Lambourne for 1 year.

My Journey to East Asia

This past year, from December until August, I travelled around East Asia as part of my University of Toronto exchange. I began my journey in South Korea, where I spent just over a month attending classes at Yonsei University and studying Modern Korean Literature.


I then travelled to Hong Kong for two weeks of personal travel, before heading to Beijing, China, the main destination of my exchange. I lived in China for five months and worked as an English teacher for Grades 5 and 6 students at a private languages school. In total I taught over 300 students! While in China I took several courses, including Mandarin language, Kung Fu, calligraphy, Chinese paper cutting, and Chinese painting. Though based in Beijing, I was able to travel throughout Northern China to Xi'an, Chengde, Luoyang, and other areas. After completing my teaching in China, I travelled throughout Japan for three weeks.

My experience was extremely interesting, and enlightening in many ways. Though it was definitely challenging, I learnt a great deal, particularly around cultural differences, and my abilities as a teacher.

I had the opportunity to get a glimpse into new cultures. Each one of the countries I visited was so vastly different, and even within countries there was massive cultural diversity between regions.

Becoming enculturated was certainly a challenge: from learning how to greet people and purchase groceries, to understanding social codes, there were so many unexpected differences and challenges. All of these experiences allowed me to learn to understand the world in new ways. I began to shed the biases and ideas I had developed from my own cultural background, and to be open to different interpretations of the world around me.





Next, I also developed invaluable skills as a result of my teaching. My specialty at the University of Toronto is Education, and I have been a volunteer teacher in several schools in the TDSB.

My previous experience, however, could never have prepared me for the experience of teaching abroad. I had no curriculum and no assistants; it was simply me, with my classes of over 30 students, learning English together. Some of my classes spoke extremely good English, and indeed I could have full conversations with these students; with other classes, my students could not even say hello. I had to be creative in finding ways to connect with my students; to get to know my students to find out what interested them so I could create engaging lessons; and I had to hone my classroom management abilities. All of these skills will continue to serve me well in my future endeavours, and the experiences showed me what I am capable of as an individual and as a teacher.

Overall, I greatly enjoyed my experience — I met some interesting people, tried some incredible food, crossed a visit to The Great Wall off my bucket list, and learnt a great deal about myself and the world we live in!
