We tend to take so much for granted – our family, our friends, our volunteers, and finally our teachers. It struck me at the end of the St Andrew's Social in 2018 that we gave an enthusiastic ovation to our musicians, which, of course, was richly deserved. Our response to the teacher whom we also thanked wasn't quite as robust. Don't you feel that the teacher deserves the same enthusiastic response?

Did we as individuals approach that teacher and personally thank her for all her hours of dedication, research, and commitment to making the evening the success it was?

Teachers spend endless hours preparing classes, creating interesting programs, following guidelines, travelling for hours, not to mention the expense of purchasing books and music and, finally, the commitment to arrive on time every single week of the year. Teachers are usually the first to arrive and the last to leave.

While teachers make that commitment, dancers can come and go as they please.
Teachers do not have that privilege. When was the last time you thanked your teachers?

Have you told them how much you appreciate their contribution to our Society and to our Branch in particular? Regardless of what happens in their personal lives, they always arrive on time with a class prepared and ready to teach.

To our teachers—a huge "Thank you!" from me, for everything you do. You are our ambassadors. Your value is priceless. Our teachers are an integral part of our Society, and we cannot afford to ignore them. They need your support as much as you need theirs.

To our volunteers who regularly go unnoticed—thank you also for being so willing to step in and do whatever is needed.

As an aside, the economic value of 25000+ volunteers in (Australian) community radio broadcasting is worth \$617 million. What price would you put on our volunteers for Scottish country dancing?



MARGARET BAIN ~ a Memoire

Just a few weeks ago, there was a Celebration of Life attended by family and friends of Margaret Bain, a veteran Scottish country dancer who died in late November.

For much of her dancing life in Canada, Margaret was a member of RSCDS Toronto and danced with the Petronella social group in Thornhill under the guidance of first Janette Todd and then Carole Skinner. It so happened that back in the 90s and well into the 21st century, the Petronella dancers had made contact with a concert organization that, every August, ran a week-long series of variety



performances at Roy Thomson Hall (RTH). It was called the RBC Seniors' Jubilee. Petronella's involvement started with just eight lady dancers that



included Margaret, but expanded with male dancers for many years thereon. I don't have to tell you that for all of us, Margaret included, facing an audience of nearly 2000 each afternoon at RTH was an unbelievable adrenalin charge never to be forgotten. But wait, there's more! The Jubilee also included a top-performing tap dance group called the Scarborough Show Stoppers. Margaret had learned how to tap as a child and quickly became involved in this group which always opened the Concert Series with the show's overture. I also want to tell you that Margaret was an accomplished ballroom dancer with whom I have enjoyed on numerous occasions doing a mean foxtrot.

Margaret & Donald Horner How about this? Several years ago, along with another Petronella dancer, Dorothy Freel, she journeyed to China with a group of RSCDS Toronto dancers. Margaret and some of the dancers performed a Scottish country dance on the Great Wall of China, to the delight of a large audience of tourists. Was that a first for SCD?

Early November last year was my final opportunity to share a strathspey with Margaret, following which she said, "Barry, will you give me a big hug?" I complied of course! Was that a premonition or what?

Ron Macnaughton: Thoughts on SCD Photography

Iso enjoy the enthusiasm and dramatic moves of other dancers. I'd like to capture those magical moments and share them with non-dancers, but my camera usually misses the magic. Several things about SCD make photos especially challenging.

Timing: I've seen photographers start at the beginning then leave after a few dances. My experience is dancers get more animated once we've warmed up.



Composition: A wide angle photograph, such as this from the balcony at the Toronto workshop, can be very grand, especially when dancers are doing large figures like circles or all turning with great covering. But most wide angle shots of mine just show a jumble of people moving in many directions. Images are confusing without a dramatic centre of attention or many doing the same thing. I particularly like photos showing a small number of dancers moving, or individuals showing their exuberance.

Exposure: Most Scottish dance venues have low light levels. To get enough light on the chip, you need either a wide lens opening, long exposures such as 1/60 of a second which, give blur, and/or a high ISO setting, which produces speckled noisy images.

Focus: With dancers milling around, it's hard to get sharp focus on the person or people of interest. Wide angle shots give sharper focus, but when cropped and enlarged, any problems become more visible. This expanded detail from the above photo, even with a quality camera, has problems compared to a closer sharper photograph.



Ideas for Camera Settings: Each camera works differently, so some things I mention might not be available. Reread the manual; in most cameras the SPORT mode acts in a similar fashion to what I suggest.

I've had poor success with automatic exposure mode. That can lead to over long exposures, which don't freeze action. Shorter exposures are needed when close to moving dancers or using a telephoto – the very situations which make for expressive photos. Many cameras have a mode where you set the exposure (e.g. 1/125 second) and the camera adjusts the rest. An alternative is to pick a ISO/exposure/f-stop setting after tests and use that for the whole program — if indoors.

Sharp focus is a bane of SCD photography. Normal automatic focus measures the distance to many points in the image and adjusts the focal distance to nearer points. I find that seldom gives me good focus, especially on dancers in the middle of the set whom I want to be the centre of attention.



I use spot focus mode. The camera adjusts focus to one point, which is shown on the viewfinder. That point by default is the middle, but I set it for the top ¼ of the view. The photo above shows the LCD screen of my camera with a red square marking the focus point. I wanted Louise to be in focus, but not the dancers behind. I particularly like images which capture wonderful expressions of the joy of dancing – a major reason people want to join our world.

Another strategy is to use manual focus. I set the focus distance to where I expect the action to be and then use burst mode to take many pictures a second. As dancers mill around, most images will be out of focus, but some will be golden. Check burst mode at home because some cameras can only take a few images before getting overwhelmed. Faster cards or 'jpeg only' setting helps.

If you use advanced features like these, it is important to recheck all the settings frequently. It's easy to get hundreds of out-of-focus images if you forget to reset it from manual mode.

Composition: Composition is where the art of photography comes in. Many of my dud images were taken from the sidelines, with no centre of attention. Watching videos of dances helps to identify special moments. You can plan to be in a good place to image moments such as the hand clap in *Happy Meeting*, flirty eye contact in *Balgeddie Reel*, the Espagnole in *City of Belfast*, balance-in-line in the *Reel of the 51st*.

Non-dancing moments can make great pictures: counting sets, bow and curtsy, briefer in focus with dancers out of focus.

Once at Dancing in the Park, a newspaper photographer saw *allemandes* and decided to get to ground level with a wide angle lens looking up. He captured the moment as my partner and I turned to the centre. A teaching colleague posted that photo in the school staff room in an effort to tease me.

I find the best action shots are in reels such as *Mairi's Wedding*, especially of dancers like Chris (photo below) who has more hair than I have. I wish I had pointed the camera a little lower and the room had been more elegant.

I hope these suggestions give ideas for capturing the incredible happiness of Scottish country dancing.







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Proposed Revisions to the Procedures Manual — AGM 2019

At the 2019 AGM the Board will be proposing revisions to the Procedures Manual, a process that requires approval by the membership. A revised Procedure Manual illustrating the proposed changes will be posted on the website for review by the membership. Any changes must be submitted to Board by March 27, 2019, 30 days before the AGM and be supported by ten (10) Full Members of the RSCDS Toronto Association (RSCDS TA).

Revisions to the Procedures Manual have come about for the following reasons.

1) Article 3.2 and 3.3: With the intent to encourage young adults to join the RSCDS TA, it is proposed that the category "Young Adult Membership" be extended to those 18 years to under 35 years old (currently set for 18 to under 25 years) and that the annual fee for everyone applying in this category be \$43. This age group will still fall under the Single Adult category for Society membership. RSCDS TA will continue to forward membership fees to the Society as required for Single Adult membership fees.

"Junior Associate Members" will be called "Youth Associate Members" and this category will continue to apply to anyone age 12 to under 18 years. This category does not currently pay fees to the RSCDS TA; however, the Association does pay fees to the Society on their behalf.

MOTION: Be it moved that the Young Adult Membership be extended to member applicants eighteen (18) years to under thirty-five (35) and that the annual fee for everyone applying in this category be \$43.

- 2) Volunteer Convenor duties have been transferred from the Membership Director to the Vice Chair.
- 3) Article 6.6 Standing Committees: This Article will just outline the Executive, Nominations and Finance Committees. Articles 6.10 to 6.14 providing detailed responsibilities of other Board "Committees" will be removed since, in practice, these committees do not exist except for the current "Marketing Committee" which may more simply be informed by the procedures stated in Articles 6.5.1 and 6.5.2. Any further changes or operational details for this committee or any detailed responsibilities of Directors and Convenors supporting the RSCDS TA will be outlined, if required, in a revised Operations Manual.
- 4) <u>Article 3.4 Membership Application and Admission and Article 3.6 Membership Fees</u>: Further to point 2) and 3), text in the Procedures Manual that has previously referred to the Membership & Volunteer Committee, will now simply refer to the Membership Director's responsibilities.
- 5) Other minor edits: All proposed changes will be evident through "Track Changes".

MOTION: Be it moved that that revisions to the Procedures Manual as presented to the Membership be approved.
