Teachers' Pet Dances: Nigel Keenan



Hmmmm. My Top of the Pops five favourite dances; that's a toughie. It would be easier to name the top 50! We'll have to adopt Rodin's The Thinker mode, as choices can depend on formations, footwork, favourite music. Forgive my liberties with The Queen's English.

<u>The Australian Ladies</u> (R8x32, Robert M Campbell, Glasgow Assembly) ~ Who can resist one of Bob Campbell's best? The dance was written for visiting ladies* from Hunter Valley Branch, New South Wales. The flowy formations of the first half contrast with the square-shaped second half, especially after Bob changed the original final formation for supporting couples to Set & Cross instead of Rights & Lefts.

The classic lead tune was scored as a 2/4 march by Pipe Major William Ferguson of the Cowal Highland Games in Dunoon, 1926, to welcome the inaugural visit of the Australian Ladies National Pipe Band. The tune speed has to be cranked up to our reel tempo – which not all tunes respond to well. In fact it's THE only original march tune we use for our dances that Don Bartlett WON'T play (Boo hoo hoo)!

The Black Black Oil (R5x32, Drewry, Deeside Book 2) ~ For many, the best 5-couple dance ever published by (in the view of many) the greatest devisor of all time: John Drewry, John of Bon Accord himself! He was from Melton Mowbray, Leicestershire, but he lived and worked in Aberdeen most of his life. Whether Drewry, or our code breaker, Hugh Foss, invented the 5-couple set with 1s and 3s starting as in Polharrow Burn may never be agreed on, but our SCD world has never been the same since!

The lead tune, *Fitful Head*, is of Shetland origin, both by "pen & place", having been penned by Shetland fiddlers Tom Georgeson and Tom Anderson MBE about a promontory on mainland Shetland. Georgeson first used it as lead tune for his dance, *The Duke of Edinburgh's Visit to Shetland*, honouring the 1953 visit of the Duke, when he opened the George V Playing Fields.

Bratach Bàna [Gaelic: white banners] (R8x32, Drewy, Bon Accord Book) ~ Another belter from the pen of the 'master', as when first trying to master the dance I'd oft' have to wave the white flag in defeat. The olde song mentions twa castles on Skye — Dunvegan of the McLeods and Duntulm of the MacDonalds. We'll never know, but could the title refer to the olde flag of the McLeods, which is largely white?

As far as music goes, the lead tune taken from the olde Gaelic song is certainly classic and catchy, but of course it's just *de rigueur* – if not *sine qua non* – that the olde 2/4 pipe march *The Black Bear* be included in the repertoire. The first recording for the dance was by Andrew Rankin, who included *The Black Bear* as a supporting tune, and it quickly became associated with the dance. *The Black Bear* is a traditional 'retreat' march – as they call it when parading soldiers leave the parade ground, or as in Tattoo when being called back to barracks.

* Three first-generation immigrants, an English lady, a Scots lassie, an Irish colleen, and a lady descended from an 18th century convict of uncertain genealogy.

Cadgers In The Canongate (R8x32, Walsh, RSCDS Book 9) ~ The unique reels are (referencing My Fair Lady's Ascot Opening Day Gavotte) ABSOLUTELY THRILLING — though they may have been a mistake! Cadgers was just published when Miss M discovered Gates of Edinburgh. She's purported to have said: "OOPS, that's likely how cadgers should have been done but as we've published it, it's too late the noo!"

It's simply <u>a must</u> that the alternate lead tune, *John McNeil's Reel*, be used, <u>not</u> the ghastly original tune after which the dance was named – although, little fear of that as only Le Society ever recorded it.

The Robertson Rant (S80, Sq.Set, Mrs Douglas Winchester, RSCDS Book 39) ~ I come from the Roberson-Reid-Duncan CLAN DONNACHAIDH, so it has to get the nod over other square set dances. It was first developed as a demo dance for The Thistle Club in Edinburgh, basically a Robertson Clan club. The final phrase of dancing around the set in Allemande hold initially had no fixed barring, as once 1st couple reached their starting position they would lead the other couples off the floor, and the music just went on and on...

As the dance gained popularity and the Society wanted to publish it, there had to be a specific number of bars for the final phrase. They decided on a 8-bar phrase with each couple returning to their starting position for the bow and curtsey. However, ending with ladies in the centre in (dare I say) a St George's cross formation resulted in a 'fight about the fireside'. Over the years, different locales developed Heinz 57 varieties in the reels and other formations, so the Society publication has notes longer than the instructions, if not "As lang's my arm"

If a once-and-to-the-bottom encore (*Ha!*) is requested, I support Aussie Rules: where the gents and ladies MUST switch places! Holy Shamoly, that throws the gents into a tizzy!

As regards music, again it's *de rigueur* – if not *sine qua non* – to play the classic quartet of tunes proposed by the devisor (a Robertson by birth). The first tune, *Struan Robertson's Rant*, is traditional for the clan chief, but the other three tunes are scored by Mr Iain Stuart Robertson, after whom a dance was named some decades later.



- 25-32 2nd, 1st and 3rd couples dance six hands round and back. Repeat having passed a couple.

50th Anniversary of a Unique Honour

Fifty years ago, Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon, was awarded a unique honour in Scotland. He became the first ever 'Freeman of Langholm', a title bestowed upon him at a ceremony in the parish church. He was made Freeman of the 'Muckle Toon' during his visit

in March, 1972, three years after his lunar landing. He is the town's first (and only, to date) Freeman. The Dumfriesshire town in southern Scotland is the traditional seat of Clan Armstrong. Langholm is right in the heart of Armstrong country, a clan once infamous for sheep rustling expeditions across the English border.

After he was sworn in as Freeman of Langholm, Neil said: "It's said that the most difficult place to be recognized is in one's own home town. And I consider this, now, my home town."


As a mill town, Langholm's speciality at the time was quality woollen cloth. A unique Lunar Tartan was created for the occasion, a subtle blend of charcoals, browns, and light greys to represent the lunar surface, with red running through to indicate the flames of the rocket. Langholm is also a musical town, and a local piper wrote a tune to celebrate the occasion: *Commander Neil Armstrong's Moonstep*.

This year, special events in Langholm and at Gilnockie Tower will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the moon landing in recognition of the Armstrong who rode to the moon and made it safe hame again. "Safe oot, safe in", as the Common Riding saying has it, for this famous freeman of Langholm!

Yellow Book Revisions



Every year the Board reviews the Operations section of *The Yellow Book*. The section includes the terms of office and responsibilities of Directors and Convenors, and also terms of reference for various committees. While there are often minor changes (e.g., deadline for submitting material to the secretary for the Archives), this year a number of more significant changes and additions were made.

- 1. This year, the Board felt it would be beneficial to add a Convenor in the Outreach and Marketing portfolio. Dancing in the Park is one of the best opportunities we have for interesting the public in SCD, and thus recruiting new students to classes. These students are potential future members. Our members are great at interacting with the public, but it was felt it would be helpful to have a Convenor specifically in charge of maximizing the marketing potential of this event. The Program Dancing in the Park Convenor will continue to do all of the bookings, filling in permit applications, etc.
- 2. Another change was to the Term of Office for the Vice-Chair. In the past, it said "the Incumbent must have previously been a member of the Board, former Executive or Convenor for a period of at least two years". This has been changed to state that "previous experience is recommended but not essential."

The Toronto Association is an organization that is dependent on volunteers. We are extremely fortunate to have so many people who are willing to jump in and help. During the 2018-19 dancing season (our last complete season) approximately 100 of our 280 members volunteered in some way, and quite a number volunteered in more than one area. Many of our members have given freely of their time over decades and their commitment has enabled the Toronto Association to flourish. The new wording for the position of Vice-Chair allows the Nominating Committee to widen their search, and gives them a greater range of members to choose from. This could enable a motivated, enthusiastic volunteer, with relevant experience, to join the Board as Vice-Chair.

3. A further change to *The Yellow Book* is in the Appendices. The pandemic has necessitated additions: attestation forms, COVID policies, safety protocols, and additional steps needed when planning events were included for the first time.

Donation Funds held by the Toronto Association

At the upcoming AGM, April 23, we will review our financial position. The Association is on solid financial footing. Our cash position includes various sums that have been donated to the Toronto Association. Normally, Toronto Association programs and activities such as monthly dances and association classes are financed on a break-even basis. Since the association has generally managed its activities well over the years, we have used only a small portion of donated funds — some have been held for many years; some for decades. As we restart dancing activities in this post-COVID era, the Board plans to allocate some of these donations to help kick start our activities. We will keep everyone informed when donations are being used.

These donation funds are available for allocation:

- ♦ \$75 in memory of Jean Hamilton
- ♦ \$1,050 in memory of Ron Bell to support Dancing in the Park

FINANCIAL MOTIONS

At the 2021 RSCDS AGM in Perth, the Society agreed to a fee increase of £5 for the upcoming year. At our AGM in April 2006, a motion was passed that any fee increases from the Society would automatically be passed on to Toronto Association members. As there has been very little activity for the past two years and we are working to retain and attract new members, it was felt that this was not the time to increase our membership fees. The Toronto Association has sufficient reserve funds to absorb the increase in the short term.

The Board moves that with regards to the Society fee increase for 2022, we waive the RSCDS Toronto Association 2006 motion to automatically pass on fee increases from the Society to our members, for the 2022-23 dancing year.

The Board moves that the financial engagement for the 2022 fiscal year be a compilation engagement.

MOTIONS TO AMEND THE BY-LAWS AND PROCEDURES

During the pandemic the government gave permission to corporations to meet electronically. The new legislation (ONCA – Ontario Not for Profit Corporations Act), which came into force in October, allows corporations to continue to meet this way, provided it is in their bylaws. Proposed changes to the wording in our by-laws and procedures are in **bold**.

Be it moved that articles 3.4 and 6.5 of the By-laws be amended to say:

- 3.4 Quorum and Meeting A quorum for the transaction of business shall be five (5) Directors including at least one (1) of either the Chair or Vice-Chair. Except as otherwise required by law, the Board may hold its meetings at the Head Office of the Corporation or at any such place or places, **or electronically**, as it may, from time to time, determine.
- 6.5 Annual and other Meetings of Members The Annual or any other General Meeting of the Members shall be held at the Head Office of the Corporation or elsewhere in the Province of Ontario, **or electronically**, as the Board may determine and on such day as the Board shall appoint.

Be it moved that article 6.7.4 of the Procedures be amended to say: 6.7.4 The Executive Committee may meet by conference call **or other electronic means**. Officers who participate in this call are considered present for the meeting.

The following changes are being proposed in order to have more flexibility with the publishing of motions. Members are requested to get any proposed motions to the Secretary before the February Board meeting – the February Board meeting is after the publication of the February newsletter. The motions need to be shared with members at least 60 days before the meeting, the March newsletter would be too late. Should any motions be sent by members, if we could put them in the February eNotes it still fulfills the mandate of being published at least 60 days before the AGM.

Be it moved that articles 5.1.1 and 5.1.3 of the Procedures be amended to say:

- 5.1.1 The RSCDS Toronto Association holds its Annual General Meeting (AGM) on a yearly basis within six (6) months of the end of the fiscal year. The Board sets the place, day, and time of the meeting; the Secretary will publish this information in the newsletter **and/or electronically directly to members** at least sixty (60) days in advance of the meeting and will also include:
 - i. the draft Agenda for the AGM;
 - ii. motions to amend the Procedures Manual proposed by members or the Board in accordance with Article 3.7 of By-Law No. 1;
 - iii. motions to amend the By-Laws proposed by members or the Board in accordance with Article 10.1 of By-Law No. 1;
 - iv. motions to adjust membership fees approved by the Board in accordance with Article 3.6.1 of the Procedures Manual;
 - v. other motions as put forward either by the membership that are supported by ten (10) full members of RSDCS TA, or by the Board as sanctioned by an affirmative vote of a majority of Directors.
- 5.1.3 The Secretary of the Board shall advise all Full Members at least two (2) weeks in advance of the Annual General Meeting date and of motions to be addressed by publishing them in the Association's newsletter **and/or electronically directly to members** and **on the** website.
