Credit for the composition of this excellent dance goes to Moira Korus, Halyna Sydorenko, and the Rosedale dancers.

As the year ahead unfolds, I hope we can all return to a sense of normalcy and the events we loved in years past come back to post-pandemic life. 



Pet Dances: Barry Pipes

I never did think that after doing 100 separate submissions for *Set&Link* over a ten year period (*What's in a Name?*), I would be asked to write a piece about my five favourite dances. Favourite? Only five? Truth be known, I've never been big on favourites. After spending over 25 years dancing Scottish,



I think there are too many dances close to my heart. Certainly, a lot more than five. So, I'll pick five that have always been somewhat special to me for one reason or another. Here they are.

Let's start with a well-known and very popular strathspey, Bonnie Stronshiray¹. What a lovely dance this is! I believe it was devised by Bob Campbell to reflect his love for his Argyle home, located by the top of the windy Loch Fyne near Inveraray. You need to lay on some extra style while enjoying this one.

For my second choice, I've opted for a John Drewry reel called *The Blooms of Bon Accord*². This should be special to Aberdonians everywhere. As you may or not know, the city motto of Aberdeen is "Bon Accord".

In this instance, one should set aside any negative views about what was Scotland's capital for North Sea oil. Forget about oil as a climate control issue. It seems that Aberdonians have also been well into horticulture through their past, and some time ago, won a national prize for their abilities in the bloom business which was celebrated by John Drewry.

You know that you are in for something different when the dance opens with two chords, the first is to recognize your partner as usual, but on the second chord, the third and fourth couples switch sides. From that point, you are now in the hands of one of Scotland's most creative Country dance devisers.

Here's number three! It is another strathspey that has caught my fancy, named *City of Belfast*³. Devised early in the 2000s, it moves very elegantly, and winds up with the not-too-common formation called the Espagnole. Again, you need to bring your most classy dancing chops into play to get full enjoyment from this dance.

Now let's take a brief look at *Bratach Bàna* 4, another Drewry reel. This is a real "flag waver" and you need to be ready to dance it twice – as often happens – the second time from a "once and to the bottom" repeat. Pay attention to the lovely wide loops one can take at the corners that give the dance a strong feeling of controlled motion. That was choice number four, and I'll wrap up my limited special selections with another strathspey.

Have you ever worked yourself through the Set & Link formations of *Gang the Same Gate* ⁵? In my view, to dance a Set & Link with poise and elegance gives me nearly as much pleasure as reading RSCDS Toronto's well planned and managed monthly newsletter. *Gang the Same Gate* has two such moves, first up and down the dance and the second crosswise.

So those were my five special selections. I hope I reminded you of the great satisfaction you can derive in dancing any of these selections. Three out of five being strathspeys? Well, let me say that when your dancing time is running out due to the inevitability of advancing years of age, you will likely cherish the opportunity to focus on strathspeys to a greater extent.


Time was, I could gallop breakneck down the middle and back without skipping a beat. Moreover, I could deal with being tugged around a dance-ending circle by one or two macho males in the set trying to accelerate the rotation. But, no longer! I turned 90 last June, and it certainly has slowed me down a little more than somewhat.

Bottom line, folks: Enjoy your favourites while you still can.

We do not dance without hearing and revelling in the music. But, do you ever lose track of which round you are on in the dance? Here is a quick tip that will keep you from joining in that final circle too soon or too late.

Listen closely to the music at the start of the dance. This is generally the main or title tune for the dance. Most of the time the musicians will play this tune again for the last round of the dance.

So, if you are dancing along and you say to yourself:

"Hey, I think I've heard this song somewhere before!" that déja vu moment is not a sign you are getting too old for this. It is your signal that any minute now you will be able to get a drink, take some air, or rest your aching feet — after jumping in for a circle and a last big WHOOP, of course.




As some contemplate dancing... some spectate... some dance. And then there's dancer Janet Markham. Janet recently competed in the gruelling Ironman World Championships in May, 2022, in St George, Utah. Fighting hot temperatures and fierce winds, Janet competed against almost 3,000 athletes to:

- 1. Swim 3.86 km
- 2. Cycle 180.25 km
- 3. Marathon 42.2 km

"I did my first ever ironman distance swim in open water, and it was a highlight. The bike section was incredibly hilly - plus HOT - and many athletes (more than 20 percent), myself included, got pulled off at one of the time cut-offs."

The brutal bike track was the second highest elevation to be climbed, with a cumulative elevation gain of 7400 vertical feet on all the uphill sections. It is an undulating, up and down, unforgiving desert terrain.
