Scottish country dancing first commenced in Toronto when a group started up in the Earlscourt neighbourhood in 1950. By 1955 Toronto dancers had organized to become an Affiliated Group of the RSCDS. In September, 1957, while attending an afternoon tea-party in Toronto held in her honour, Miss Milligan declared the Toronto Group a

BRANCH of the RSCDS. This declaration assumed official status in Edinburgh on October 7, 1957. The first Friday this October will be our 65th anniversary.

The coming year will be historic, not just in marking our 65th anniversary but also in a post-pandemic return to dancing in social groups and monthly dances (respecting appropriate COVID protocols). To mark the occasion, the executive commissioned a commemorative publication of local dances. The committee's work will be led by Vice Chair Arlene Koteff. Members include David Booz, Maureen Richardson, Jane Robinson, and Theresa Malek. Rob Lockhart will provide publication assistance.

The RSCDS worldwide embarks on celebrating its 100th anniversary, although the 100-year mark does not actually arrive until November 26, 2023. A key event in the lead-up will be a Spring Fling event next May hosted in Toronto. We step onto the world stage of Scottish country dancing. Everyone can look forward to that.

A teacher candidate class organized by Tony Szeto recently concluded with examinations conducted in July. All participants, who all hold memberships in the Toronto Association, achieved success in the July exams – Sue Batt, Sarah Ferguson, Leo Roytman, Kathryn Lecoq, and Rachel Watt – and are to be congratulated. Their goal of becoming fully certified Scottish country dance teachers moved one step closer. Congratulations also go out to Tristan Gerrie, who completed his Part 1 teaching at the TAC Summer School Calgary a few weeks ago.

Thank you to everyone who has renewed their membership. It is that time. If you haven't renewed yet, please remember to do so. It is extremely important for the health of our organization, and there is no fee increase. Scottish country dancing remains a bargain in these inflationary times.

Erin Mills Scottish Country Dancing Celebrating 50 years

In the Fall of 1972, Wes and Brenda Clindinning started the Erin Mills group at Brookmede School in the Erin Mills community in what was then the Town of Mississauga. Streetsville, under Mayor Hazel McCallion was a separate town, as was Port Credit. The current City of Mississauga was formed in 1974 and assumed the boundaries of the old Township of Toronto.

That is enough history of Mississauga.

The Erin Mills group rapidly grew with Wes as the teacher and in 1979 a beginners group was added under the tuition of Jean Hamilton. It was at that time that Deirdre introduced me to SCD classes. Both groups met on Friday evenings at Pierre Laporte school in Erin Mills. The beginners ran for one hour under Jean and the skilled dancers met immediately after under Wes. The beginners were not allowed to participate in Wes's class but could remain for a short while to observe. After a few months, the beginners were permitted to participate in the first dance of the second class!

Wes retired from teaching the Erin Mills group in 1980 and Jean Hamilton took over the position. Doug Stephen took over the beginners class. Both classes were flourishing and Doug wanted more time for the beginners. He moved the beginners to another evening (Tuesday) and to another location until they were able to secure the Tuesday evening back in Pierre Laporte. <See Erin Mills page 3>

Jean Hamilton was also teaching the Ceilidh Demonstration Dancers and encouraged several Erin Mills Dancers to join the group. Over the years the Ceilidh Group danced for many Seniors' Residential Homes, Hospitals as well as more formal events at theatres and dinners and performing at Gala Dances.

In the mid-1980s, Betty Pellegrin started a Children's class that ran for a number of years and then handed it to Iszzilah Mckay who in turn asked if I would teach the class in their basement. Demand grew and we moved back to Pierre Laporte before moving to Meadowvale Town Centre. The class then became known as Whigmaleeries. For a number of years we had three children's classes, juniors, mid and teens with three teachers, Ishbel Thomson, Deirdre MacCuish Bark and myself. The classes lasted until 2012.

The Erin Mills group was instrumental in starting the West Toronto Ball and the West End Workshop, both of which continue each under their own committee. Erin Mills also ran a Hogmanay Ball for many years.

Jean Hamilton taught the Friday Erin Mills class until COVID forced the stoppage and unfortunately the class has since folded.

The Tuesday Erin Mills Class continued through COVID via Zoom and restarted in-person classes this past March. It has been meeting at Cooksville United Church in Mississauga for over 25 years.

intensively was significant, and occasionally stressful, but our tutor, Rebecca Blackhall-Peters from British Colombia, and musician, Gary Thomas from California, were incredible sources of support and instruction. Despite the long and busy days, they managed to keep the tone positive, which helped keep us motivated. I was amazed at how much we learned - both with our own dancing and technique, as well as the skills needed to be an effective teacher. I have a deeper appreciation for the work our teachers do weekly after getting a taste of lesson planning. The balancing act of being mindful of my own technique, observing dancers in the room, and providing teaching points, all while maintaining a smooth pace and flow for the class, was a definite mental workout!

My fellow candidates were from across Canada (Ontario, Alberta, and Nova Scotia) and had a wide range of experience in their dancing and teaching. This was helpful as we worked through our assignments together, and meant that we could draw on each other's expertise. Working as part of a small group of four candidates meant that we got to know each other well, and the relationships I formed were a highlight of the week.

I was fortunate to be surrounded by friends and dancers from Toronto during my time at Summer School. It was nice to spend time with folks "off the dance floor," and to get to know some of our Toronto members better. Special thanks to David Booz, who danced with the candidates for our Unit 2 exam, and to Moira Korus, Suzanne Batt, and Vicky Zeltins, who offered support and suggestions as I worked through some of my assignments and lessons from the course. Thank you as well to the numerous Toronto dancers who wished me well leading up to the course, and e-mailed with well wishes while I was away. I feel fortunate to be a part of such a supportive group.

I am delighted to say that I passed both examinations, and am looking forward to completing my Unit 4, which involves practice teaching. I will be working with Moira and Erica de Gannes with the young adults class, and my father, Blair Gerrie, who teaches the Tayside dancers.

Thank you to the Toronto Association for awarding me a scholarship to help with my teacher training. I am very appreciative of the generosity and ongoing support of the association, and am looking forward to contributing to our Toronto dancing community. He was encouraged by fellow dancers and teachers to apply his high school teaching skills to becoming a dance teacher and he completed his full certificate in Toronto in 1993. He later became a member of the Glenview Group, where he assisted Robin Matheson with teaching duties.

It was Glenview's loss when in 2007 he and Sharon moved from King City to Wasaga Beach, where he continued to dance with, and sometimes teach, the Wasaga group. However, they were still very much a part of the Toronto Association by continuing to attend Toronto events.

Robin will be fondly remembered.

Scottish Country Dancing at Calvin Comes To An End



The Calvin SCD Group announces, with great regret, that our classes can no longer continue. In the fall of 1957, a Scottish country dance group began to meet in the lower hall at Calvin Presbyterian Church. It flourished for decades, especially under the leadership of teachers lain Macfarlane (1960–1980) and Frances Gray (1980– 2010). Isabelle MacPherson taught beginners classes in the upper hall for many years and continued to support the group after she retired. Vicky Zeltins taught at Calvin from 2010 until Covid-19 brought

an end to social dancing in March 2020. Dancers enjoyed live music at weekly classes until 2004; Don Bartlett was at the piano for many of those years and continued to play at Christmas and spring parties. The lower hall at Calvin Church was once filled with dancers on Tuesday evenings. Over the years, however, membership and attendance have progressively fallen, while costs have risen. Calvin Church will be under renovation in the fall, and when we investigated other venues, it was clear that we could not meet the expense. After so many happy years of dancing, it is with great sorrow and disappointment that we have concluded that there is no option but to discontinue the group. We hope that everyone who danced at Calvin will find another group to join and will continue to enjoy the pleasure of Scottish country dancing.
