From the Chair...

By now you are likely aware of the proposal to be made at the annual general meeting in April to raise Toronto Association fees. This is a consequence of pressures including increases in the membership fees levied by Scotland. Toronto's membership fees were last raised in 2016. If our fees had been raised each year subsequently by the rate of

inflation, by 2022 the fee structure in the current year would have been \$81 for a single or \$150 for a joint membership. It is the board's hope that members will not find the proposed approximately 7% fee hike unduly onerous.

Unwelcome news has arrived that the Hillcrest social group is coming to an end. This follows on the decision of the St. Clement's group that it could not continue, and the prior winding up of Calvin. Hillcrest and St. Clement's survived and prospered in the past in particular due to the dedication and extraordinarily hard work of their teachers – Jean Noble at Hillcrest and Teresa Lockhart at St. Clement's. Personally, I had the pleasure of dancing on Monday nights at the St. Clement's group, which met at the Bishop Strachan School. We owe both Jean and Teresa a considerable debt of gratitude (and to the volunteers who assisted them). I want to express on behalf of the Association our appreciation of their very considerable efforts.

Social groups have been at the heart of the Toronto Association and its history. The board remains committed to making every effort to ensure that they will be able to survive and thrive. We are a federation of social groups and they have historically been a key source of our strength. Hopefully new groups can arise in the future to help take the place of those that have departed.

February would normally see us dancing at the Tartan Ball. The ball this year will be replaced with an extra monthly dance. This is an opportunity for us all to come together to strengthen our bonds as an association and enjoy what we love most to do – Scottish country dancing.

As most of you know, the Toronto Association is creating a book of dances by and for Toronto area dancers to commemorate the Toronto Association's 65th anniversary. We anticipate a publication date in the spring of 2023, which coincidentally marks the Society's 100th anniversary year.

Our daunting task is to select from this treasure trove and publish a book that is representative and honours the story of SCD in our Association without becoming encyclopedic.

Nevertheless, we want to leave no stone unturned, so we are asking the Toronto Association membership if you know of any "hidden gems" of dances that we should consider. If so, please contact the devisor to ask if they would like to submit it for consideration.

Criteria for Submission of Dances for Commemorative Dance Book

In order to prevent a tsunami of dances being submitted, the committee has developed the following criteria for submission:

- We are accepting only existing dances (devised pre-December 31, 2022); i.e., no newly devised dances.
- We are not considering dances that have been published in RSCDS books, in publications funded by the Toronto Association, or if copyright permission is unattainable.
- Please do not re-submit dances that have already been submitted for consideration for Book 53.
- Devisors can submit a maximum of two dances; if more than one dance is submitted, they must be in different tempos.
- Include the title, number of bars, tempo, etc., the date devised, and clear dance instructions.
- If you have suggested music, please include it.
- Be sure to include any story or background information about the dance that will enhance its enjoyment.
- Please indicate in writing that you give permission to have the dance published in the dance book.
- Note that dances may be edited for consistency and to follow standard Society nomenclature and conventions; by submitting a dance, you grant permission.
- Submissions must be in a Word document using a standard 12-point font like Arial.
- Dances are to be submitted as an attachment and emailed to Arlene Koteff by February 28, 2023.

Better Mask for Dancing

I find wearing a mask is frustrating; my glasses fog up and the elastics pull on my ears. The biggest problem is when I'm exercising, it can be hard to get enough air, especially when the mask flops in

Even though COVID numbers are lower, I'm still wearing a mask, even when not required. Alison Booz pointed out mask concerns in an email to me, which was in last month's Set & Link. I asked her where to get better masks. She suggested CanadaStrong.ca which markets several models. I bought large black CANADMASQ and also VITACORE CAN99e models. They arrived in less than a week.

The photo shows Alison modelling the white CANADAMASQ.



The nose piece metal is stiffer than many other masks so less air escapes when I breathe out. My glasses fog less, and the thicker ear loops are more comfortable. This mask has a structure which holds the filter material further from my faces in a way which does not move in and out as much. That structure provides a larger area of

filtration which means I don't have to work as hard to draw in enough air to keep dancing. CANADMASQ is no longer sold on CanadaStrong.ca, but they still sell the VITACORE CAN99e model at ten for under \$20. Their website at https://www.canadamasg.com/ also gives test results.


