Children's Workshop – It's not just for kids!

There was something different ■ about the Children's Workshop this year - it wasn't just for kids! Conveners Moira Korus and Teresa Lockhart decided to include a simultaneous Parent's Workshop. So, while Fiona Philip taught the little ones downstairs at Swansea Town Hall, Linda Ashe Argent taught their parents in the upstairs dance studio. Most of the parents had never really tried Scottish Country Dancing before, though they faithfully bring their kids to class. It was a good opportunity for them to discover why their kids enjoy it so much. In fact, the dance studio was a room full of smiles, as they followed Linda's masterful instruction.

Before long, a rudimentary skip change of step had been learned,

and simple formations such as down the middle and up had been tried and understood. Linda moved along quickly to hands across and figures of eight. Finally, she introduced (gasp!) The Poussette! Smiles broke into open hilarity as the parents struggled with that demanding exercise. But there were helpers in the room, experienced dancers to ease the novices through the mysteries. Our Vice-Chair, James Graham, was gracious with his assistance, as was young Amanda Scott of the Woodglen Children's Group. The parents loved it! Before they left to collect their youngsters, they successfully, and joyfully, danced *Swansea Riggs* (devised by Linda).

Later in the morning, it was the older students' turn. While Fiona introduced the teens to the amazingly complex Celtic Reels (which they 'got'!), Linda gave their parents a lesson in Strathspey (she felt parents of teenagers would especially appreciate the quiet strength and dignity of strathspey). Indeed, it was a delightful interlude as two parents in particular, who are from France, were able to experience this uniquely Scottish dance form, which their daughters demonstrated on stage at the Peter McCutcheon Celtic Christmas concert. Linda devised a strathspey to suit the abilities of the participants and it was wonderfully successful. Again, parents went home with smiles, and a new appreciation of their kids' accomplishments.

50th Anniversary Dances

Jean Hamilton explains the background to dances of special significance in the Monthly Dance program.

The Reivers – Reel devised by Ronald Morton Smith and published in Book 23

Professor "Sanskrit" Smith formed and taught the Rosedale Group in 1955, a founding group in the Branch which did much to popularise the dancing in Toronto. In 1980 Professor Smith was honoured for 25 years of continuous teaching service.

John Anderson's Reel – Reel devised by Bob Campbell and published in Glasgow Assembly

The lead tune for this dance was composed by Bobby Frew for Jean Anderson's husband, John. Jean was a renowned teacher of Scottish Country dancing. She trained a demonstration group which entertained at the Royal Alexandra Theatre and the CNE, to name but two venues. Jean taught Branch classes and workshops and as an accomplished pianist often played for participants in the Children's Festivals and for Teacher Candidates at their examinations.

Brochan Lom – Strathspey devised by Iain McFarlane in 1970

Iain was Chair of the Toronto Branch from 1963 to 1965, and was considered an excellent instructor, and "Calvin's greatest influence" over twenty years. He taught Branch and Candidate classes in the 1960s, was active in the St. Andrew's Society and the Gaelic Mod held in Toronto.

Iain, a Gaelic speaker, devised this dance to work on the new formation, the Rondel, with a group of teachers in Hamilton. It was danced to a "highland style" of Strathspey indicative of Iain's ability to teach and demonstrate Highland setting steps, and has on occasion been danced to "mouth music," since the tune *Brochan Lom* is familiar to many. 

The Montgomeries' Rant

As natives of Normandy in France, the Montgomery(ie) forebears were very much part of England's invasion by William the Conqueror around the time of 1066 (and all that!). The name likely derives from *Mont*, the French word for hill upon which their castle sat, and either a Roman general named Gomericus or a 9th-century Viking named Gomeric, who must surely have been interrelated somehow. Whichever, La famille de Montgomerie, also referred to

back then as "Mundegumerie", hailed from an area of Basse-Normandie that is now known as Calvados after the superb apple brandy which is distilled there.

Roger de Montgomerie was granted lands in Britain, probably shouldering a lot of Saxons out of the way to do so. He also invaded Wales, where still there exists the town of Montgomery in the Welsh Border country. Roger's descendants then went on to acquire further lands in Scotland, until by marriage, the family owned the Ayrshire lands of Eglinton and Ardrossan, creating the Earldom of Eglinton.

Clan Montgomery became notable for their ongoing support of Royalist causes, and for their bitter feud with the Cunninghams. In fact, through the 17th, 18th, and 19th centuries the Montgomeries always seemed to be in the forefront

wherever a war or rebellion was going on. This might support the juxtaposition of their name with the bellicose word "Rant".

The Montgomeries' Rant came to light in RSCDS Book 10 during the mid-30s. It is a most exuberant reel, well suited to be danced either at the end of a Ball or just before an intermission, as you will experience at the January 2008 Monthly Dance. ... Barry Pipes

Pilling - The Wee Green Book



When Shona and I started Scottish Country Dancing in 1992, we were somewhat familiar with the basic steps and a few of the more familiar formations. However, by the end of our first evening at Keith Bark's class at Pierre Laporte School in Mississauga, our heads were spinning.

On the drive home that evening we hardly spoke a word. Instead we found ourselves deep

in thought, concentrating on the movements and formations that our fellow dancers had guided, indeed often nudged us through, and we tried to recall the names of the six or so dances we'd been taught that evening!

When we arrived home, I headed for the liquor cabinet as Shona rushed to find a couple of pens and some note paper. Each of us jotted down as much as we could remember of the geography of the dances we had been taught, and by midnight we were fairly confident we at least could commit most of the dances to memory by the time we went to our next class.

To our dismay, we were taught another six completely different dances! More formations! We also learned that if we continued with this pastime, we would have to learn hundreds of Scottish Country Dances!

Not having immediate access to RSCDS Dance Books, or handouts, for these dances, I had to come up with a simple, quick method to record the movements for each dance.

I had a flashback to the time I was studying for an Engineering Certificate. I remembered a series of Motion Study symbols developed by Frank and Lillian Gilbreth [best known through the biographical 1950 movie *Cheaper by the Dozen*, starring Clifton Webb and Myrna Loy]. The symbols were called "therbligs" [Gilbreth spelled

backwards, well almost!], and although the Gilbreths' table of symbols did not exactly match my dancing needs, they would be the basis for my personal dance symbols.

Sometime later, while checking my "therbligs" before the beginning of a dance, a friend, Helen Bibic, remarked that Barbara Taylor also used "Pilling's" notes! When I was introduced to her, I learned for the first time that a book, *Scottish Country Dances in Diagrams* was available from TAC Books.

The following week Barbara gave me her spare copy of the "Wee Green Book".

Although my dance symbols and those developed by F.L.Pilling were not identical, I was surprised to find that they were relatively similar. When I look at Pilling's diagrams, I immediately see a "picture" of the dance, and "a picture is worth a thousand words".


The eighth and latest edition of the "Wee Green Book", which measures $10 \text{cm} \times 13 \text{cm} \times 1.5 \text{ cm}$, fits easily into any sporran or purse, and contains over 760 dances in diagram form. It covers many, but not all, of the RSCDS Dances in use today, including some popular but "unofficial" dances, and a few Drewry dances.

The "Wee Green Book" is intended as an *aide-mémoire*. It should be used strictly to jog the memory. You learn the formations, steps, technique, phrasing, handing, and all the finer points of Scottish Country Dancing from the RSCDS Manual, Association Classes, and instructions from your Social Group Teachers.

For those of you who may think the Pilling system of symbols is too difficult to learn, I would direct you to www.dancenotation. org. Click "Notation Basics" and have a look at the "Lebanotation" system! You'll appreciate the elegant economy of Mr Pilling's curious diagrams.

In the example from Pilling's, imagine that, like Miss Milligan, you are looking down from above. The top of the set is to the left. On bars 1 - 8, 1st woman casts off and followed by her partner they dance the track shown in 6 bars, leaving two bars to "set" and complete the phrase. Similarly, for bars 9 - 16, 1st man leading. In bars 17 - 24, the diagram indicates 1st couple dance down & up, or is it lead down & up? You have to know which is correct! The "P" in bars 25 - 32, doesn't mean "Park" in top place for 8 bars! Pilling's "P" represents a Poussette, danced by 1st and 2nd couples!


