Chair's Message




arch 14 was another excellent Beginners' Night. I hope everyone enjoyed the evening, and that our newer dancers felt welcome and included. and are now a bit less

Motions re: Membership Fees 2009-2010 Dance Year

As noted in the January 2009 issue of *Set & Link*, RSCDS has revised the structure for the International portion of our membership fees effective July 2009, giving a cost reduction to 80% for each of 2 adults at the same address.

- As the motion, which was passed at our AGM in April 2006, was worded so as to cover increases in the portion of the membership fees assessed by RSCDS in Scotland by an automatic increase in Toronto Association membership dues for the following dance year, housekeeping motion that Toronto Association adult membership fees be adjusted automatically to reflect CHANGES in RSCDS adult membership fees payable to RSCDS in Scotland.
- 2. As no increase is needed to the Toronto Association portion of the Fees at this time, motion that the 2009-2010 Membership Fee structure be as follows:

Single Adult Membership	\$65 (no change)
Household Membership First Adult Member Each Additional Adult at same address	\$60 \$55
Student Membership (age 18-25)	\$45 (new category)
Keep In Touch Membership (newsletter only)	\$30 (no change)
Youth Associate (Under 18 as of October 1)	\$ 5 (no change)

New dances and formations are created all the time; however, the foundation of the new dances stays the same. It may be very old fashioned, but I for one would hate to see this particular tradition change.
