Dance Devisors & Designs: James B. Cosh

My first encounter with the word *cosh* (n. & v.t.) meant *a bludgeon or the act of using the same*. Some years later, as a member of a class of non-believers, I was introduced into the bliss of the hyperbolic cosine function (typically notated: *cosh*). Still later, I was intrigued when this single, unmodified word appeared on dance programmes and in dance descriptions.

Who was "Cosh"? We are privileged to quote from a communication from Janette McTaggart, daughter of James B. Cosh.

James Bower Cosh (sometimes called Jimmy) was born in 1912 in Glasgow. He trained as a master baker and had bakery/shops in various areas of Glasgow. In 1938 he married Rose Walker and they had 4 children, 3 sons and 1 daughter. For all their married life James & Rose stayed in Struan Avenue, Giffnock, and shared many hobbies including bowling, gardening, scottish country dancing and listening to music. Jimmy was a great whistler and often said that he loved the 4 5's: STRAUSS, SOUSA, SULLIVAN & SCOTTISH. He began dancing under the direction of Miss Milligan at the Glasgow Branch of the RSCDS and it wasn't long before he, along with friends, started the Glenshee Club which was to run under his direction from 1952-1992. The demand from its members for new dances initiated his first venture into devising his own. James had a good mathematical brain and relished in inventing new movements, sometimes intricate, and matching them up with the appropriate music. The ideas and titles of these dances came from personal experiences, either relating to friends, occasions or special places in scotland that he loved to visit. Sometimes friends were invited to the family home and a set tried out his latest dance in the lounge, just to make sure the figures and phrasing were just as he wanted. James's first six dances were published in 1959 and eventually a total of twenty-two were in print. All the proceeds were donated either to disabled children's charities or to the training of guide dogs for the blind. He loved corresponding with fellow dancers all over the world who requested his books, mainly in Canada, Australia & New Zealand. James died in 1995 at the age of 83 and his family is very proud of the wonderful legacy he has left to scottish country dancing in scotland and world wide.

James published *Glenshee Collection 1 through 5, Six Scottish Country Dances,* and *Twenty-Two SCD and Two Others,* altogether 11 publications.

Still don't feel you know James B. Cosh? He devised both *Mairi's Wedding* and *The Irish Rover.* — Coshed again! ... *Ross Floyd*

Dancing in the Park: A Brief History

ccording to Isabelle MacPherson, who remembers it well, ADancing in the Park began on a Tuesday evening in 1963 at Edwards Gardens. It was organized by Tom Cunningham, who was instructed by park authorities that dancing would be held in the pavilion only, with no amplification of music and no dancing on the grass. The dancers must have impressed the powers that decided, however, because the next year they were allowed to do both. In 1969 the dancing was transferred to Toronto Island, which caused transportation problems at times. One night the band missed the ferry, but caught the next one so that the evening merely got off to a late start. Grace Harris remembers that "some of the teenagers enjoyed the bushes there" to which David Grant replied, "You're bringing some spice into this, Gracie!" In 1971 the dancing was moved to Sunnybrook Park, then back to Edwards Gardens in 1996, where it has been held ever since.

Dance Etiquette



Rights & Lefts and Polite Turns

Rights and Lefts is a movement of crossing to the other side of the dance by giving a right or left hand, so how can it go so wrong? Hands should be joined in a shake-hand hold about shoulder height, with the elbows bent (think of making a W). Hold your arm in that

position while you cross. Move in a curve instead of a straight line. Remember - let go. Holding hands too long leaves your arm stretched behind you losing the W and perhaps causing an injury.

Polite Turns. Holding on to dancers and forcing them around with enough strength to put them off balance or on their derrière is never helpful. Use the last left hand to hold on to help the dancers into the turn; if they don't want to go, don't push. Remember dancing is a team effort. Gently helping one another enables all to enjoy the dance.*Carole Skinner*

What's In A Name? Reel of the Royal Scots



Those planning to be at the 40th West Toronto Ball on May 9 will have the opportunity to enliven themselves with this exhilarating reel. It is a frequent addition to many SCD events and celebrates the oldest Regiment in the British Army. What became the Royal Scots was raised initially as the First Regiment of Foot in 1633 by Royal Warrant of Charles I, great-grandfather of the "Bonnie Prince" himself.

Over the past three hundred and seventy

five years, the Royal Scots has a rich history, including being nicknamed "Pontius Pilate's Bodyguard". Name a theatre of war or battle involving the British Army, and chances are a battalion of the Royal Scots was there to claim battle honours...Waterloo; the Crimean and Boer Wars; World War I (Somme, Ypres, Gallipoli); World War II (Normandy, Italy, Burma); and even the first Gulf War. Along the way, Royal Scots infantrymen also claimed seven Victoria Crosses, the ultimate British military honour.

But wait a minute! "Pontius Pilate's Bodyguard"? What kind of a sobriquet is that? Did they claim to be Roman legionaries at one time? It is said that around the first millennium the Romans recruited both Hibernians (erstwhile Scots) and Gauls into their Legions. This historical possibility apparently caused tongue-in-cheek arguments between the Royal Scots and a French regiment, both of whose forebears may have seen duty at a significant religious event around Jerusalem. Who knows what reality may exist to these hypotheses...?

Just two years ago, the Royal Scots regiment was down to a single battalion and was merged with other surviving Scottish infantry regiments. As part of this merger, it has now become the 1st Battalion, Royal Scots Borderers of The Royal Regiment of Scotland.
