# Jean Hamilton's Star Shines at the AGM

Keith Bark Writes — October/November is not the best time of year to visit Scotland, but once again, Deirdre and I took a vacation in Scotland so we could attend the RSCDS AGM Weekend, and make some family visits.

Though late in the season, there were still many tourists about, but our worst traffic jam was on the Isle of Harris when we encountered a crofter taking 20 or so sheep along the road, possibly to a fank\*. We had to stop. . . then proceed *cautiously* as dogs moved the sheep along. After Harris, we headed back to the mainland and Inverness. The ferry this year was only gently rocking and rolling — last year we sailed through a force 10 gale!

Inverness was dry and mild, ideal for shopping. Deirdre added to her acquisitions in Harris and, as usual, we had to buy another suitcase for our journey home. We were to drive Deirdre's cousin Fiona to the AGM in Glasgow so this extra case caused a problem in our hire car. We had to fit various cases and bags in the back seat alongside Fiona. The Ball was 21 dances long, with music by Ian Muir and his band. The RSCDS AGM was Saturday afternoon and Toronto had five delegates: Deirdre and me, Jon Friend, Jean Noble, and Jean Hamilton. Early on the agenda was Scroll of Honour presentations – of which Jean Hamilton was one of five recipients.

Toronto put forward a motion requesting the Society provide funding towards the cost of running examination centres. The motion generated much discussion and, though it failed, there was interest in the proposal and suggestions were made on how it could be changed and presented in future.

Saturday evening featured another dance of 18 dances with music provided by the Lothian Band with George Meikle. There were about 700 dancers on the floor that evening.

Things Deirdre and I enjoy most about the AGM Weekend are the two dances, one formal and one casual, with such good numbers of dancers. It's wonderful to meet dancers we only see once a year or so, and great to match faces with names. We have met and made many friends over the 11 years we've been attending the AGM. The next night the enormous hall was packed as we danced to the music of the renowned George Meikle and the Lothian Band. After 45 dances in two nights, it is fair to say that the feet did require some TLC!

Having the opportunity to meet so many names associated with RSCDS reinforces its fine work not just in Scotland but around the world. The 2011 AGM was a truly memorable experience and well worth the trip to Glasgow – as, I am sure, will be the 2012 AGM to be held in Aberdeen.

#### Tartan Ball — Past

 $\overline{\mathcal{T}}$  ROM THE ARCHIVES... Digging through old NEWSletters, I came across this article, an excerpt from the November 1996 Newsletter which, in turn, was reprinted from the Ardbrae Newsletter of April 1996, with kind permission from the author. It is an out-of-towner's perspective of the 33rd Annual Tartan Ball, a mere sixteen years ago. Many dancers came from Ottawa in support of our guest of honour that year, General John de Chastelain.

So there I was, a veteran dancer of 11 years, preparing to "experience" the Toronto Tartan Ball, and feeling like a beginner again! I wasn't 100% sure of all the dances on the programme; so many of the faces in the ballroom were unfamiliar, and I was certain I'd never find a partner.

The Tartan Ball, possibly the largest Scottish Country dance ball in Canada, is held each year in February, at the Royal York Hotel. Much larger than the Chateau Laurier, the Royal York is equally grand, providing a splendid atmosphere for a formal affair. The huge Concert Hall in which we danced, with its enormous chandeliers and dark oak floors, easily accommodated the 500 attendees -- yes, 500! [Not quite! Ed.] Ottawa residents General John de Chastelain and his wife MaryAnn were guests-of-honour this year.

Surrounded by all this splendour and with such inspiring music, did I get a chance to dance? I certainly did — and most often with excellent partners in excellent sets. I found that, if one comes well prepared, a few seconds will suffice to recall figures, and the rest of the interval can be spent socializing. In sum, the Tartan Ball is a very glamorous event and a very enjoyable one. I recommend it.



# Grace Notes



Marguerite Elizabeth Agnew (at left): Jan. 17, 1920 – Nov. 16, 2011 Marguerite was an active member of at least four Scottish country dance groups in Toronto: Glenview, Hillcrest, Newtonbrook, and Richmond Hill. We remember her for her cheerful wit, her poetry recitations, her whimsical stories of Little Albert (borrowed from Stanley Holloway) delivered in a perfect Mancunian accent, and for her flowered hat which she wore while presiding over the tea table. We extend condolences to her family.



#### Ian Powrie

Born: 26 May 1923, in Perthshire.

Died: 5 October 2011, in Australia, aged 88

Ian Powrie was a young Perthshire ploughman whose brand of traditional Scottish country dance music would come to delight audiences around the world for decades, particularly through his appearances with the White Heather Club. He began to learn the fiddle at age 5. As an adult, he was often a judge at fiddle competitions.

Powrie could not seem to decide whether he was a farmer or a fiddler; he swithered between the professions. He was similarly undecided as to whether he was a Scot or an Australian. He emigrated to Australia, *twice*. His identity crisis is perhaps unintentionally portrayed metaphorically in the dance, well-known to confuse and delight Scottish country dancers: i.e. *Ian Powrie's Farewell to Auchterarder*. Alas, Ian made few modern recordings, if you want to enjoy his music you have to hunt for rare vinyl records.

# What's in a Name? Portnacraig

ere's an intriguing name! Is it geographical or historical? *Portnacraig* is a 32-bar reel devised by Perthshire's Linda Gaul around 20 years ago and published in Book 36. As it happens, this reel was included in the November Monthly Dance program for all to enjoy.



The lady herself needs no introduction. Linda was Chair of the RSCDS organization at Edin-

Established in 1650, it is at the site of an old ferry which goes way back to the 13<sup>th</sup> century when local monks operated the crossing service for the price of a coin dropped into a nearby wishing well. The ferry is long gone, having been replaced by a suspension bridge in 1913.

Does this mean that Linda Gaul may be quite familiar with Pitlochry and environs? Well, it so happens that around every late February / early March, RSCDS holds its Winter School at Pitlochry's Atholl Palace Hotel. What's the betting that Linda has long been a regular attendée?
