# Dancing in the Park ... mmm ... Sardens!

ccording to Isabelle MacPherson, who remembered it well, Dancing in the Park began on a Tuesday evening in 1963 at Edwards Gardens. It was organized by Tom Cunningham, who had established the Scarborough Social Group with his wife Marg just two years previously. He was instructed by the park authorities that dancing would be held in the pavilion only, with no amplification of music and no dancing on the grass.

The dancers must have impressed the powers that be, however, because the next year they were allowed to do both. In 1969 dancing was transferred to Toronto Island, which naturally caused transportation problems at times. One night the band missed the ferry but caught the next one so that, happily, the evening merely got off to a late start. Two years later the dancing was moved to Sunnybrook Park, close to the Riding Stables, where it remained for 25 years. In 1996 it was decided to move back to Edwards Gardens for more community exposure, where it remains to this day.

While the Dancing in the Park location and format has been constant for the past 15 years, that is not true of the surroundings. What has changed is the former Civic Garden Centre, which has transformed itself into the Toronto Botanical Garden. That's the area that we all walk through from the car park in order to get to the green, crossing over into Edwards Gardens as we near the TBG café. The four acres of land around the parking lot have been transformed into 17 themed gardens, planted not only for aesthetic reasons but also to provide urban gardeners with ideas for designs and plantings.

Very appropriate this year is the Celtic theme for the vegetable plantings in the kitchen garden. On May 25 our demo team will provide entertainment at the Taste of the Garden event in the Garden Hall when the kitchen produce will be prepared for the guests to sample.

As both a dancer and gardener myself I know that gardens and dancing go well together ... Dancing in the Gardens ... or DIG. What a neat pun! And while I know it's a well-worn cliché, do come early and stop and smell the roses before you dance. There are no roses at St. Bonaventure School immediately south of the parking lot, but we are happy that we now have a regular bad weather location. We have contacted the café about staying open for us but have no details as yet.



## What's in a name? Maxwell's Rant

ere's an old favourite! For many of us, Maxwell's Rant was probably one of the first ten dances with which we felt comfortable as beginners. Sixteen bars of cross-over reels (however you like to call them), twos out, threes in, smooth flowing and great music to match.

Maxwell's Rant sur-

faced in RSCDS Book 18 around 1955 when SCD in Canada was still in its infancy. I don't know about then, but it later became very popular. So, who devised this tasty reel? Well, his name was Rutherford! Never heard of him? The same guy who also devised *Machine Without Horses, Balquidder Strathspey, Lassies of Dunse,* and many more dances you may be familiar with to a greater or lesser degree? Walter Rutherford was a native of Keith in Banffshire, maybe the pride and joy of the Banffshire SCD that celebrated its 75th birthday in 2004.

And how about Clan Maxwell? Banffshire too? No, the Maxwells are a lowland clan from the area now known as the Scottish Borders. The name is derived from the name Maccus, who was a Norman baron going back to 1066 (and all that!). He gave his name to a pool (Maccuswell) close to the town of Kelso on the river Tweed. This area used to be called Roxburghshire.

Now here's an etymological obscurity for you. Clan Maxwell is considered armigerous, which means that they currently do not have a chief recognized by Scotland's heraldic authority, the Court of the Lord Lyon. This is not to say that Clan Maxwell is in itself an obscurity. They have a large Society in Canada, formed in 1993 using the Latin motto *reviresco*. It means "I flourish again" which, interestingly enough, is also used by the highland Clan McEwen.

Clan Maxwell has quite a number of septs, one of which is called Pollok. This could be of interest to some of our Glaswegian members, who may likely know about Pollok House. It has been owned by the Maxwells for a few centuries, and sits in Pollock Country Park (the "c" is apparently optional!). This park, which also contains the Burrell Collection, a wonderful art gallery, is adjacent to Pollokshaw Road, which circumnavigates it, just off the M77.

All that said, don't forget to go to our AGM at the end of April. You'll be able to hustle your way through Maxwell's Rant, which is on the dance program...and don't forget to watch your timing!

But when we dance, we are not only exercising our bodies, we are giving our souls a break from our lives. Dancing, the physical activity, is a great way to release endorphins into our systems which then help to fight off the blues.

If meeting up with people you haven't met before, or perhaps haven't seen in a while, will lift your spirits then come dancing. But, if you're in a funk, stay home. We're happy and we want to stay that way.

## RSCDS Chairs' Conference

n a warm, sunny spring Saturday afternoon, the first RSCDS Chairs' Conference of the Branches and Affiliated Groups in the Southern Great Lakes Area met in Toronto. Overall, the group felt that the exchange of ideas and the opportunity to connect with others, both near and far, was very beneficial. There are questions and suggestions that will be delved into further in the groups and branches before the next meeting, scheduled for October 22, 2011, the place to be determined.

An 8x32 Reel for 3 Couples in a 4-Couple set by Sue McKinnell\*

Suggested Music: The Reel of the Gordon Highlanders from "Gang On The Same Gate" by Green Ginger.

#### **Bars**

- 1-8 1C set and cast off 1 place as 2C step up. 1W with 2C and 1M with 3C dance RH across, passing RS into...
- 9 16 1W with 3C and 1M with 2C LH across,
  1C ending in the center RS to RS facing opposite sides.
  1W followed by 3W and 3M dance up the men's side,
  across the top, and down the women's side;
  while: 1M followed by 2M and 2W dance down the
  women's side, across the set, and up the men's side
  (this is known as a snake pass). Ending order is 3, 1, 2.
- 17 24 1C turn RH 1¾ then dance out the ends into half reels across the set, 1W passing 3W in 2W's position RS and 1M passing 2M in 3M's position RS.
- 25-32 Diagonal rights and lefts, 1W changing up and 1M changing down to begin.

#### Repeat.
