The 49th Tartan Ball is now just over a month away. Let's make this year's ball the best yet. If you have not already done so, order your tickets today, so that you may enjoy a spectacular evening of good food, good fun, and good dancing.

We are delighted to have Michael MacMillan and his wife, Cathy, as our Guests of Honour. They are eager to join in the fun. They will be leading our Grand March and after speaking with him at a recent ball, I am fairly certain they will try Scottish country dancing! Come to the ball and join us in providing a warm welcome to our Honoured Guests.

Michael MacMillan may not be a household name; however, he is very well known in the entertainment industry. Michael was previously the Executive Chairman of Alliance Atlantis. Michael co-founded Atlantis Films in 1978. In its early years, Atlantis was primarily a film and television production house, winning an Oscar in 1984 for its short film *Boys and Girls* and an Emmy in 1992 for *Lost in the Barrens*. In 1993 Atlantis became a broadcaster with the launch of

its first network, Life Network. In 1998 Atlantis acquired Alliance Communications (and became Alliance Atlantis). It was under Michael's leadership that the company operated thirteen Canadian television networks including HGTV Canada, Showcase Television, History Television, and the Food Network. The company also distributed and produced movies and television programs, including the hit series *CSI: Crime Scene Investigation*. In 2007, Michael, along with his partners, sold Alliance Atlantis to CanWest for \$2.3 billion. Now a philanthropist, he is currently vice-chair of the Toronto East General Hospital Foundation Capital Campaign, a \$60 million private sector campaign to raise funds for the hospital's \$210-million redevelopment project.

After 49 years, the Tartan Ball is well steeped in tradition. However, every year there are small changes. At this ball we are pleased to provide a complimentary coat check, located just outside the Concert Hall foyer. As well, this year we will not have assigned line marshals. Instead, there will be very handsome, oak, thistle-topped line markers at the head of each set. These will have wooden 'fingers' attached. We request that the first man in each set take these 'fingers' before he counts the set and use the them to indicate to the MC the number of couples required. Once the sets are complete, first man returns to the top of the set and returns the 'fingers' to the line marker so that they are ready for use in the next dance.

We would like all dancers to attend the ball. However, if you are a newer dancer and feel you are not quite ready to attend a grand formal ball, we encourage you to come and watch the dancing from the balcony of the Concert Hall. You will know what to expect when you come next year. The dancing begins at 9 p.m. – and it really is spectacular.

If you are eager to put the final touches on your dances, attend the Tartan Ball practices (see p.6). These will be listed on our website and in the February *Set & Link*.



Ball Etíquette: Carole's Advíce



(**X**) ith the Tartan Ball fast approaching, let's take a few minutes to review some rules of the dance floor. Find your partner and chat until the MC asks you to form sets, then proceed to the dance floor and form straight lines. In order to do this, you need to be aware of the other people around you. When you are forming sets, do it from the top of the hall. If a set is formed, don't squeeze in; join at the end of the line. However, as you are forming the set look around and make sure you are not blocking someone from joining your group.

The first man counts the lines. Because you have formed a straight line, this will be done quickly and easily. If a couple is required to complete your set, only the line marshal should indicate how many couples are needed. It's very confusing for the MC to look down to the bottom of the hall and see that three people require two couples. So is that six couples needed, or only two?

While the dance is being briefed, please don't talk. You may know the dance, but the person next to you may need the reminder.

If someone needs help during the dance, let one person help. It's very confusing having seven people yell different instructions for the same four bars.

The dance isn't over until the final chord, so pay tribute to the musicians and your partner by using the chord to acknowledge your partner. Then you can applaud the wonderful music and break up the set, clearing the dance floor as quickly as possible.

Please, do your homework! If you plan to attend the ball, make sure you are familiar with all the dances on the program. Going over a few dances a day on your own is a great way to reinforce what you have been taught in class. If you have no clue how to do a dance, don't do it.

The Tartan Ball is our premier event of the year. By following some simple rules. we can all get the most enjoyment out of the evening. See you on the dance floor.

The Society's Scroll of Honour - RSCDS's highest accolade - is awarded for exceptional contribution, generally to the RSCDS at large as well as locally. If you wish to nominate someone, consult the RSCDS Toronto Secretary (Pat Clark: pat.clark@kos.net) for

the requirements of the process.

Nominations are only considered by the Society if made from a Branch (Association). Nominations, including details of service and supporting letters, must be submitted to Pat by January 31, 2012.

Nominations for Branch Award

The Branch Award is made by the Society in recognition of service, largely to a particular Branch/Association. Again, the nomination

must be sent by the Association to Scotland, so please send any nomination for a Branch Award to Pat (pat.clark@kos.net).



Normally, the Society expects no more than one submission a year from any particular Branch/Association (though couples may be

nominated jointly), so if there is more than one nomination the RSCDS Toronto Board will have to decide among the nominees before putting a name forward. Please consult the Branch Award guidelines and use the nomination form available on the RSCDS website, or ask Pat to forward you these documents.

Deadline for submissions is January 31, 2012.

Nominations for Volunteer Award

We are fortunate to have so many members willing to volunteer

their time to assist with various RSCDS Toronto activities throughout the year. Without these people, it would be impossible to organize the monthly dances, prepare and produce the newsletter, hold workshops, etc.



Please think of members who have volunteered their help and gone above and beyond normal expectations for the Association or a social group and consider showing your appreciation by nominating them for a Volunteer Award. The following are the criteria to be kept in mind: They may be dancers or non-dancers. They must have been involved in volunteering activities within the past five years and must be active supporters of SCD and/or SCD music. They may not be current Board members, convenors, past chairs or someone who is paid for their services. They can, however, be past Board/Executive members, but not within the last five vears.

We have written to teachers and contact persons to ask each social group to submit up to two nominees who they feel warrant recognition. Please give a full explanation of the activities and extent to which your nominees have been involved.

There will be no more than five awards overall for the dancing year 2011-2012. Not all nominations may be selected this year; however, anyone who is not selected may be submitted again next year.

What's in a Name? The Lochalsh Reel

t would probably not surprise readers to know that Scottish Country Dancing is alive and well on the Isle of Skye. Centred in the town of Portree, I guess, the Skye Branch was launched in 1988 and, based on some photographs on their website, seems to be doing rather well.

As many know, there are a couple of ways to get to Skye without flippers. One either takes the ferry from Mallaig, which is at the end of the Road to the Isles, or one drives over the relatively new bridge at the Kyle of Lochalsh. Kyle? It is derived from the Gaelic word *caol* which means "strait," and the Kyle of Lochalsh is a body of water separating the mainland from the Isle of Skye, which brings us to Lochalsh!

Either one word or two, Loch Alsh is geographically a sea inlet that runs eastward between the Kyle and the well-known castle Eilean Donan on Loch Duich. Ready for a bit more Gaelic? Lochalsh means "foaming lake" or *Loch Aillse* in the Gaelic. That said, from a tourist's perspective, Lochalsh also comprises the land area around the Kyle both on Skye and the mainland. A beautiful area to visit, Lochalsh has any number of sight-seeing locations to be investigated and is a source of Scottish Country Dances galore.

I already mentioned the "Road to the Isles". Head north from the Kyle and you are close to the "Cuillins of Skye" and just north of Portree is the "Old Man of Storr". I've covered them all in past editions of *What's in a Name*. Oh! And look across the harbour at Portree and the adjacent island is Raasay, erstwhile home of "Mrs. McLeod of Raasay".

Other points of interest? On the mainland side of the Kyle, you are just a hop, skip, and a jump away from the village of Plockton. While this may sound most un-Gaelic, many may remember the TV series called *Hamish McBeth* about a Highland police constable in the mythical town of Loch Dubh. The series featured Maryhillborn (that's Glasgow, folks!) Robert Carlyle, "The Full Monty" himself. The last time I was in Plockton, I didn't see highland cattle wandering down the main street as shown in the series, but it did have palm trees indicating that the Gulf Stream runs nearby.

OK! Let's get back on track here! *The Lochalsh Reel* was devised by Pat Burnett (most likely a Skyelander) from her/his *Skye Collection.* So you can treat yourself to its formations at the January Monthly Dance. For a real treat though, head up to Skye when you are next in Scotland. There's lots more to see around Lochalsh!
