# Carole Skinner: A Genuine Ambassador of SCD

Carole Skinner learned earlier this year that she is to receive the RSCDS Award of Scroll – the Society's highest honour – at the AGM in Scotland in November. These excerpts from the Nomination Committee's letter highlight some of Carole's strengths and accomplishments.

C arole Skinner reflects the spirit of Scottish Country Dancing. She is the soul of patience, whether it's teaching a new formation or polishing a dance, which she accomplishes with passion, enthusiasm, and generosity.

Carole has been part of Scottish dancing since she was a child – first in Highland dancing and then Scottish country dancing. Carole earned her full SCD teacher's certificate in 1997. As a teacher, Carole instills confidence in the most nervous dancers. One of her students said: "I despaired that I would ever understand and learn how to



dance properly; Carole Skinner demystified Scottish country dancing for me."

Carole's dedication to her Scottish roots and to RSCDS have been evident regardless of where she has lived – Montreal, Tucson, or Toronto. She danced with Bob Millar's demo team in Toronto from 1976 to 1980. After she moved to Montreal in 1991, she served on the committee for their annual weekend, served as membership secretary of the branch, and started the children's group in Dorval in 1993. Carole moved to Arizona in 1994, where she served on the Board of the Tucson Branch, first as member at large and eventually as chair – a position she held until her return to Canada in 2002.

Upon her return to Toronto, Carole started teaching at two groups, Petronella and South Simcoe. After starting to teach the new Highlands of Durham group as well, Carole was instrumental in the group's becoming an affiliated social group of the Toronto Association. She also served on the Teachers' Panel of the Toronto Association between 2003 and 2009 and was its Chair for two consecutive terms.

Carole writes on dance etiquette for *Set & Link*. It's a gentle reminder to dancers of the social niceties of Scottish country dancing that is positively received by readers.

Carole had a long association with the late Bobby Brown, researching dances that were new to him, determining the style of the dance and the original tune, and suggesting replacement tunes.

With Stewart Bennett, Carole has planned and led six Scottish country dancing tours to Scotland since 2007. As a souvenir of each tour she devises dances unique to the experience of the group. On the tours she has arranged dance evenings with local SCD groups. Toronto dancers have met with dancers from Inverness, Dundee, Perth, Skye, Keswick, and Peebles. These evenings are enjoyed by both groups showing how the Scottish Country Dancing community is truly global.

A collection of Carole's dances, *Eternal Friendship*, was published by Toronto RSCDS in 2011.

Carole is a genuine ambassador of Scottish country dancing, committed to the aims of the Society, encouraging her students to join, and extolling its benefits. A teacher from western Canada wrote: "Enthusiasm is a magic ingredient that is essential for a teacher, but is not always easy to teach. I believe Carole has the ability to impart this enthusiasm to dancers and to her classes, therefore making her a valued asset to our world of Scottish Country Dancing."

#### Mervyn Short


Mervyn Short lives in Rustington, West Sussex, on the south coast of England, where he is a member of Berks/Hants/Surrey Border Branch of RSCDS. He is often a guest teacher at the RSCDS Summer School in St Andrews. His interests include music, sailing, travel, theatre, walking and, naturally, Scottish country dancing.

Mervyn started Scottish country dancing 35 years ago and qualified as a teacher three years later with the Imperial Society Teachers of Dancing. Around the same time he started Highland dancing and, after passing medal tests, qualified to teach. He then taught children and adults regularly at all levels. In 1995 Mervyn gained his RSCDS Full Certificate. Since then he has taught at day and weekend schools all over the UK, Europe, America, Canada, and Japan. He regularly teaches at Summer and Winter Schools. Three years ago he reduced his working hours to devote more time to dancing.

He is an assessor for children's medal tests and tutors candidates for the Society's teaching examinations. Mervyn is keen to maintain the technique and traditions of Scottish country dancing but appreciates it is an evolving dance form. In 2009 he published a book of dances with an accompanying CD. Last year Mervyn joined the Education & Training Committee.

#### **Linda Ashe Argent**

Linda Ashe Argent hails from Glasgow and as a wee one she studied many forms of dance. She immigrated to Canada in 1980 and brought with her a passion for Scottish culture. Everyone she meets gets a taste of Scotland whether through scotch tasting, Scottish country dance, summer youth dance camps, or being part of the annual Orillia Scottish Festival.

Linda and husband Jason received their SCD certificates in 2004 under the auspices of the Toronto Branch. Linda teaches children and adult dancers each week in her village hall, attracting dancers from Simcoe County. She organizes Opening Ceremonies for the Orillia Scottish festival in July, involving 10 sets of dancers from all over, as well as hosting various dance workshops.

Linda and Jason live in Hawkestone with their three children Calum (18), Nathan (10), and Nicole (10). She works full time as vice president for Special Olympics Ontario and runs the largest chapter in Canada for some 18,000 athletes with intellectual disabilities, along with 8,500 volunteers, and a staff team of 35 dedicated employees. Linda is an active volunteer with Children's Aid Society, and chair of her children's school council, and she coordinates all of the local social programs and activities for youth and adults in Hawkestone.



#### Carole Skinner

Carole Skinner was born in Scotland and fell in love with Scottish dance at an early age. Immigrating to Canada in 1966, she embarked on a dancing adventure that continues to this day. Her first dance experience in Toronto was Dancing in the Park.

Carole comes from a dancing family, so when she met her husband (on the dance floor) and then later had two girls, it was natural that they too would dance.

Carole is a certified teacher in both Highland and Scottish country dancing. She was taught by and has performed for and with some of the greatest teachers in Scottish dancing. She has continued the tradition by teaching all ages and proficiency levels in social classes and workshops across North America.

Her greatest love is choreography, where she takes the art of Scottish country dancing and turns it into a show spectacular, whether it is for the local Highland games, the Rogers Stadium, or the concert stage.



# Paul Maloney Reflects on Planning the 50<sup>th</sup> Tartan Ball Program



The 1964 program comprised 18 dances, divided into two halves by one interval, plus

two extras, as listed below. There were five jigs, seven reels, seven strathspeys, and one medley — and the program included four 48-bar dances and four 40-bar dances. Recent Tartan Balls have had two intervals separating the program into three sections (six dances, five dances, and five dances). With three extras, the total is nineteen dances. From the original twenty dances, I cut *The Buchan Eightsome* (to get to six reels — five on the main program and one extra) and *She's Ower Young to Marry Yet* (to get to six strathspeys and one medley on the main program and in the extras). Dances that were cut are highlighted in red in the 1964 program displayed here.

In the 2013 program (below), you can see that I relegated two of the 48-bar dances to "Extra" status. And I added *The New Rigged Ship* as the extra jig. (It is from Book 9, as is *Cadgers in the Canongate*, and so is typical of what might have been considered for the 1964 Tartan Ball program.) As an addition to the 1964 program, *The New Rigged Ship* is highlighted in green. I arranged the remaining sixteen dances into the six-five-five pattern.

There is one further change to the program. The Tartan Ball Committee ran a competition to devise a new dance to celebrate the 50th Tartan Ball. When the winning dance was named, I received a copy and was asked to include it in the program. I recommended to the chairman of Tartan Ball Committee that the new dance be placed third on the 2013 program and he concurred. So, *Red House Reel* (highlighted in red) was replaced by *The 50th Tartan Ball Reel* devised by Deirdre MacCuish Bark (and highlighted in green).

In this modified form, the program from the first Tartan Ball will be danced again on February 16, 2013, at the 50th Tartan Ball.

### How Serendipity, Sherry, and Erasmus Led me to Scottish Country Dance

Through a friend, I knew Ruth Jappy's sister, and I had seen Scottish country dancing at Edwards Gardens and Dundurn Castle in the early 1970s. I even visited the Trinity group as an observer a few years later. But I wouldn't have started actually dancing without the serendipitous combination of a Scottish colleague at University of Toronto Press, where I worked,

Desiderius Erasmus of Rotterdam (1466-1536), and liberal glasses of sherry.

The time was the summer of 1979. The place was the Combination Room of Trinity College. The occasion was a book launch party for a translated volume by Erasmus, the Dutch humanist, theologian, and classical scholar, whose collected works are published by U of T Press. At this launch party, every employee was invited and sherry flowed freely (both customs have, sadly, changed).



The Scotsman had heard of the Trinity group. It must have been a Thursday for we looked through the window and saw, approaching the college, a man in a kilt. Oh yes, this dance group! Four of us went to have a look. I had always considered myself incapable of any kind of dancing but somehow I ended up in a dance – that's how the sherry comes in – and then two nice people persuaded the teacher, John Hurd, to let us come back next week, even though summer dancing was not supposed to be for beginners. They came early for a few weeks and taught us the steps. In other words, I was thrown in at the deep end – exactly how you're not supposed to start dancing!

# What's in a Name? The Old Spedling Castle's Ghost's Dance



This is about the ghost of "Dunty" Porteous. While other sources state that *dunty* is an Old English word meaning argument, my *Dictionary of Scottish Dialect* defines *dunty* by the archaic word "doxy", as in a synonym for a courtesan, paramour, or prostitute. Puzzling as that is, it cannot be correct in this instance as the Dunty Porteous in this tale was

yclept James. Yclept? Well, if we are sorting out Old/Middle English words, why not!

So, enough of the linguistics! Truth be known, Dunty was a quarrelsome man, a miller by trade who provided bread for the locals, including a baronet by name of Sir Alexander Jardine who resided at the nearby castle called Spedlins Tower.


It transpired that Dunty and Sir Alex became involved in a big argument. So to put Dunty in his place and confirm the futility of arguing with his "betters", Sir Alex consigned him to the Spedlins Tower dungeons under lock and key. There, Dunty stayed quite a deal longer than he had anticipated, because Sir Alex then decided to visit Edinburgh, which in the 17<sup>th</sup> century was a few days journey away. Forgetting about Dunty in the dungeons of the tower, Sir Alex took the keys with him. Many days later, Sir Alex remembered his prisoner and couriered the keys back to Spedlins.

Alas! The courier was too late — Dunty had died of starvation. From that point on, it is said that Spedlins Tower became home to Dunty's ghost, who wandered around its halls wailing... "Let me oot – Am de'en o' hunger!" As one might imagine, this caused no end of distress to Sir Alex and the whole Jardine family.

Clearly, nothing but an exorcism was required, and the Clan Jardine Chaplain, with the aid of a big black Bible, drove Dunty's ghost back into the dungeons, and there it stayed. The Bible was deposited in a staircase wall niche within the Tower, until a while later, when it was sent to Edinburgh to be re-bound.

What happened? Dunty resurfaced in full voice, again scaring the daylights out of the Jardine family.

As attendees may remember, *The Old Spedlins* (or Spedling, take your pick) *Castle's Ghost's Dance* was part of the RSCDS Toronto September Monthly Dance program. Built around 1605 on the



banks of the River Annan just up from Lockerbie, Spedlins fell into ruin. Although the Jardines are long gone, it was reconstructed in the 1970s and is now habitable again.
