
To maintain our vitality and strength, the Toronto Association needs to consider both our traditions and our future in our plans, an exercise that will keep us all on our toes!

anette Todd – This is your life!



By Barry Pipes mccallum.pipes@sympatico.ca nce upon a time, in the Kingdom of Fife, there dwelt a St. Andrews entrepreneur named Alexander Niven and his wife, Ann. A blessed event was imminent in the Niven household; the birth of a second child. Right on time, on March 31, 1934, their daughter Janette arrived. It is not clear at this late date whether Janette made her appearance doing high cuts or the pas de basque, but something in the air seemed to suggest that the St. Andrews dancing world was about to receive quite a jolt.

From the age of three, she was dancing up a storm... ballet, tap, and especially highland. But it was during Janette's secondary education that Irene Grant, an alert gym teacher, thought that the young Miss Niven might be a very good addition to the school's Scottish Country Dance class. Irene had a well-established

reputation as an SCD teacher, and moreover, was acquainted with Miss Jean Milligan herself, a frequent visitor to St. Andrews. On reviewing Irene's class, Miss Milligan referred to Janette as the "fidgety one". Also in these classes was another St. Andrews dancer, well-known to many of us... RSCDS Toronto's very own Georgina Finlay.

As the SCD world in St. Andrews evolved, it was not long before Janette was making appearances at events in the University's Younger Hall, including stooging for the regular Teacher Candidate Classes. Then, at the age of 21, another "blessed event" occurred for Janette. She met a handsome young draughtsman named Peter Todd, who promptly married her and whisked her off to Glasgow where he was employed. Always looking to improve his career prospects, Peter ultimately landed a position with an overseas engineering company, and announced to Janette... "We're going to Canada!" And so they set sail in February 1966 on a Cunard liner with, by that time, three children in tow... Linda, Jane, and Kenneth. They could have flown, but Janette wanted to experience an Atlantic Ocean voyage in the winter. And to that end, she really got her money's worth!

On arrival in Toronto, it was not long before Janette and Georgina were reacquainted, and Janette was introduced to the RSCDS Toronto Branch, where she soon became a member of a demo team managed by the incomparable Grace Harris, with Colin Harris, Sandy Bain, Roddy Nicoll, and other notable Branch dancers. Many exciting gigs ensued such as touring around Ontario with the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra. Janette considers these the halcyon days of her dancing career.

By 1975, she had acquired her Teacher's Certificate which, as luck would have it, was adjudicated by Miss Milligan who certainly remembered Janette as the "fidgeting" child of the past.

Armed with these credentials, Janette focused her attention on children's dancing. She created a number of children's classes at local public schools in Thornhill, plus classes at Havergal College and The Waldorf School. At one time, she had 175 children under SCD instruction and had entered as many as 16 teams in the annual Toronto Branch children's dance competitions. And not just children either! As well as taking Thornhill's Petronella social group under her wing, she ran adult classes in Newmarket, Aurora, and Richmond Hill. Spare time? Apparently! ...because she went on to teach some Toronto Branch classes, plus workshops in Windsor, Montreal, and Hamilton. *>> Continued on page 5>>*

Calculus, anyone?


Tony Szeto reports: A problem very similar to the following appeared in a first-year York University calculus exam in 2012. The bonus part at the end takes into account the "Light and Shade" aspect that sets apart a dancer from a physicist. Enjoy!

The Targe is a Scottish Country Dance formation. In the first 2 bars (about 2 seconds) the man (open circle) travels at a uniform pace from point A along a quarter circle (of radius 1m) to point B (refer to adjacent diagram), while the woman (square) travels $\frac{3}{4}$ way around a smaller circle (of radius 0.5 m) from C to D. The two circular paths are concentric.

Show that the greatest rate at which the distance between the two dancers increases is $\pi/2$ m/s*. At what time does this occur?

* For scale, the man travels at $\pi/4$ m/s on his path, while the woman's speed is 50% faster on her path.



O oin up! Membership costs of \$60 single and \$110 couple are not big by today's standards. By joining the RSCDS Toronto you also become a member of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society based in Edinburgh, Scotland. As an RSCDS member, you receive *Scottish Country Dancer* (the Society's magazine) twice a year, and with your membership card you can dance with member groups around the world. You contribute to keeping Scottish Dancing alive – the teachers, the classes, the workshops, the dances – the whole thing.

The RSCDS Toronto Association coordinates the world of Scottish country dancing in the greater Toronto area. Toronto Association members receive this *Set & Link* newsletter 10 times a year. Your dues cover essential expenses, and we make sure the books balance when events miss income predictions.

We are committed to cutting costs. If the cost of membership paid to Scotland drops we will cut our own costs. Last year we reduced membership fees for people opting for *Set & Link* by email. We also introduced membership sign up online with payment by PayPal and absorbed the PayPal charges.

Membership in Toronto Association has been falling as those of us in the peak immigrant generation age. But, even those who no longer dance can support the Association and RSCDS by a membership. We even have a very economical "keep in touch" membership that ensures you receive *Set & Link*. If we all pull our weight and join the Association, the cost can be lower for everyone and RSCDS will continue to flourish. So join up!

Finally, after 10 years, and being faced with health issues, Janette turned over the gig's management to Carole Skinner, who was ready and very able to carry on Janette's direction of the team. In her younger days, Carole herself had enjoyed hours of dancing with Janette.

What a dancing life! Brimful of opportunity and enjoyment! Janette still paces herself at SCD classes in both Aurora and Richmond Hill although she now leaves the teaching to others. Personally, I still consider that any opportunity to dance a Strathspey with Janette Todd is always a very special occasion. Such a regal presence! Such a blessing to Scottish Country Dancing! 
Solution: Calculus, anyone? Page 4

Let t be time in seconds. Set up cartesian axes to enable coordinates of both dancers to be expressed as functions of time using trigonometry. This leads to the distance between them being:

$$D = \sqrt{\frac{5}{4} - \cos(\pi t)}$$

Then dD/dt gives the rate at which the distance between the two dancers changes. It can be shown that this rate maximizes at t=1/3.

In the adjacent diagram, the **green curve** simulates how the distance changes between two dancers travelling at uniform speeds. The **blue curve** shows where dancers execute a degree of "light and shade". In the latter case the maximum relative speed is greater, and is reached earlier.
