No sooner had he become a member than he answered the call for a new Webmaster. Since then, Rob has maintained our website on a daily basis while continuing to update and revitalize it as needed, the latest major change happening recently. He contributes to the written and visual content, layout, and graphics and provides much of the relevant photography and video from his own portfolio.

In 2006, Rob joined the Newsletter Committee, adding his skills of proofreading, layout, and photography to the process. Still active within the committee, Rob also is responsible

for printing Set&Link, our newsletter, and manages its distribution electronically.

In the past few years, Rob worked many hours on the design, content, and photography of several books published by the Association, including: *The 50th Anniversary Book*, and the following dance books — *Golden Ghillies*, Ann Campbell's *Who's Who in Toronto*, and Carole Skinner's *Eternal Friendship*.



What's in a Name: The Castle of Mey

articipants at last month's West Toronto Ball would have had the pleasure of dancing one of the six dances included in the Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Book. By name, *The Castle of Mey*, this 32 bar reel, was devised by John Walton of RSCDS Hamilton, Ontario. Commencing with Inveran reels, this is a neat little dance of which we are sure John is justifiably proud.





Of interest to me was that the castle of Mey itself, actually had more to do with Queen Elizabeth II's mother. In the several years that I have been subjecting *Set&Link* readers to geographical stories in WHAT'S IN A NAME, spreading outwards from my early review of Niedpath Castle in the Border country, I have only once before ventured as far afield as Caithness. That was a couple of years ago when I covered The *Ferry Louper*, about mainland non-Viking visitors to the Orkneys.

The Castle of Mey is now the most northerly inhabited castle on the British mainland, located just west of John o' Groats. HM Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother, visited the castle while she was mourning the 1952 death of her husband King George VI, and later decided to purchase the estate which was at the point of being abandoned. Built in the 1500s, seemingly as a holding of Clan Sinclair, the castle's name was changed from Mey to Barrogill.



Under the Queen Mother's guidance, the castle and its gardens were vastly improved — to the point that the Scottish Tourist Board ranks it as one of the most attractive locations for visitors. It enjoys a consistent Five Star Rating. The Queen Mother also changed the castle's name back to Mey. Perhaps she wished to be known as "Queen of the Mey" (groan!) There is a village of Mey close by, although I can find no information about its derivation. Maybe rather than Gaelic, Mey is Norse in origin like the inhabitants of the nearby Orkney Islands.

As we may well remember, The Queen Mother, who died a centenarian in 2002 at the age of 101, is more closely associated with Glamis Castle near Forfar in Angus, but she should always be recognized for bravery in the 1940s by publicly refusing to leave London with her children during the devastation of the wartime "blitz". As she said at the time... "The children won't go without me. I won't leave the King. And the King will never leave."

Well, that's it, folks! I'll be back in September to share more What's in a Name stories with everyone.

2013 Volunteer Awards ~ Thank You. . . Paul, Jennifer, and Valerie



Paul Barber began dancing in Winnipeg in 1976 when his wife, Kim Malcolmson, dragged him out on cold winter nights despite his protests. It was not too long, however, before he was hooked. They danced for a brief time after moving to Toronto in 1981; however, his job interfered, so it wasn't until 1991 that he and Kim began dancing again and joined the Trinity Social Group.

Paul became Chair of Trinity in 1996 and has been responsible for its smooth operation for the past 17 years during both the regular season and the summer sessions with guest teachers. He ensures the group is kept informed about Association events and is a great supporter of them himself. The music escaping from Trinity's unique location at the University of Toronto often draws in curious visitors, and Paul not only welcomes them but also encourages them to give it a try. Paul also assisted the Trinity executive with organizing the Toronto Assembly for a number of years.

Paul first volunteered with the Toronto Branch Executive in 1997 as Convenor for Monthly Dances, and then in 1998 he took on the challenging role of editor of the Toronto Branch newsletter for two years which he handled in his quiet but capable way.

Paul is responsible for at least two people becoming dancers: his neighbours Wayne Ellwood and Liz Martin. Their interest was sparked by seeing Paul regularly heading out wearing his kilt, and he encouraged them to take lessons. Wayne has now followed Paul's example of volunteering by agreeing to serve on the Board of Directors.

More recently, Paul responded to a plea from the Board who wanted to have an outreach event in the west end. Paul contacted the appropriate people and determined Toronto Association could hold an event in Dufferin Grove Park. Since then he has been integral in organizing the event as the main liaison between Toronto Association and the Park, arranging for music by ensuring John Clark arrives with his sound system and last year arranging for a piper to march through the park in order to entice people to watch and to participate in the dancing.

Paul's diligent service to the Trinity social group and his constant, enthusiastic support of RSCDS Toronto is very much appreciated.

Jennifer Bentley, along with her husband Graham, started dancing at the first beginners' class at St Leonard's church in January 2006, and they soon became members of RSCDS Toronto Association and active participants of events in the Toronto area.

Jenn quickly became involved as a volunteer, helping with many events such as afternoon teas and the Youth Ball. Jenn served on the Volunteer Committee from 2009 to 2011 and provided several new insights. In the first year, she joined Board Members in visiting the social groups in teams of two. Jenn organized the display at the AGM of lists of members serving on Association committees. For the past three years, she has taken on the huge job of being the co-ordinator, which is of great assistance to their teacher, Carole Skinner. Jenn does all the contacting, lines up the dancers, organizes costumes, MC's most events and, when needed, dances. She was also instrumental in getting a website for Petronella group. She remains responsible for updating it. Jenn became co-chair of Petronella in 2012 and now oversees its committee and is responsible for handling announcements to the members, arrangements with the venue, and requests received via the website.

Jenn is great at promoting Scottish country dancing. She hands out business cards wherever she goes and is now promoting with bumper stickers.
