Our Medal Test

Some of the young dancers who braved the Medal Test, with Medal Test Assessor, Elaine Brunken, who was flown in by the Society for this event.

n March 1st, 2014, the Rosedale youth group performed several dances in order to earn a medal each from RSCDS Edinburgh's Medal Test Program. We were only the second group to be tested in Canada.

Each dancer was assessed by Elaine Brunken, a dancer, teacher, tutor, examiner and Medal Test assessor. It was a good experience. Before the test, we were nervous and excited but during the test we were much more relaxed.

We spent 6 weeks preparing for the test, but our teachers are always making us work at our foot work, keeping eye contact with our partner, smiling and good posture. Some of us had to keep track of having our feet turned out while others had to remember to keep eye contact. We also had a special workshop, taught by Lorna Larmour, that gave us a pair of expert, experienced eyes to reinforce the steps and formations the test required. Lots of work but lots of fun too.

Before the test began, we did a warm up dance, *The Flying Scotsman*, to get us ready and relax a little. We felt relieved after the first dance.

During the test we had to dance each of three test dances in first and second place, which was helpful. This was great because if we messed up the first time we had another chance. Learning the dances was a big part of the test — we had to brief each other before each turn started; our teachers weren't allowed to help.

We arrived early in the morning to help out. Everyone came dressed in kilts or simple white dresses. We both stayed till the very end of all the testing.

We hope to earn all 5 medals with distinction. In the weeks to come we will have our results. Everyone in the group felt happy with how they danced during the test.

Notice of motion to be made at RSCDS Toronto Association Annual General Meeting ~ April 26, 2014

At its Annual General Meeting in November 2013 the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society approved an increase of the membership fee payable to the Society, Scotland by another £2. This was on top of a £1 increase approved in November 2012 by the Society. The Toronto Association, at our Annual General Meeting last year, voted to absorb that cost and not raise our own annual dues at that time.

However, it is now necessary for the Toronto Association to increase our annual dues for the period October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015 in order to cover the extra cost of the international portion of the member dues and to meet our own needs.

The Board of Directors proposes an increase of \$10 per adult membership, with Single Adult membership increasing to \$70, and Joint Membership to \$120.

PayPal fees are reducing the amount of revenue we obtain for online transactions. In order that we may continue to offer this convenience for our members, the Board of Directors proposes to request the addition of an administration fee of \$3 be added to each TA Membership, November Workshop, or Tartan Ball online order, commencing July 1, 2014.

What's in a Name? Circassian Circle

while ago, I was asked by an RSCDS Toronto teacher what I Knew about the name "Circassian". Beyond the fact, as many of us know, that *Circassian Circle* is a round-the-room reel that had originally surfaced in *RSCDS Book 1* in the 1920s, I had to admit that I thought that Circassia was a country that had existed somewhere in the Middle East a few centuries back. To this admission, she suggested that I research the name . . . as it might be timely to do so!



Intrigued by her suggestion, I bore down on it. The first thing I remembered was a scene from the 1962 film *Lawrence of Arabia*, which I am sure many readers will also have seen, perhaps more than once, it having secured numerous Oscars. The scene that came to mind went as follows. Lawrence, played by Peter O'Toole, had been captured by the Turks in a WW1

scenario, and Lawrence, in Arab dress, was being interrogated by the local Turkish Bey, played by Jose Ferrer. Ferrer?

Remember Toulouse-Lautrec in the movie, *Moulin Rouge*? The very one! The Bey had it in mind that Lawrence was a British spy, and questioned his pale complexion. How did Lawrence answer that question? "Because I am a Circassian!" he exclaimed. It is over 50 years ago that I first enjoyed that movie. Yet the scene sprang immediately to mind! Go figure!

If one is or was a Circassian, then where exactly is home? And why is this information likely to be timely, as my informant had suggested? Here's what I found. Circassia was located in what is now Russia on the north-east shore of the Black Sea due east of the Crimean Peninsula, which in itself is certainly topical as I write. But wait! There's more! Descendants of the old Circassians consider the

Tom Gorman recently celebrated his 95th birthday (February 23), with Celtic Connections in Richmond Hill. The icing on this occasion for him was Jess Houseley's inclusion on the program of his two favourite dances – *Bratach Bana* and *Australian Ladies*. He says jokingly, "They are the only two dances I can remember!"

In the Royal Navy, Tom served on escort ships conveying food from Canada to Scotland. He served in the Denmark Strait, the North Atlantic Convoy, and from South Africa to Aden. On one occasion he saw what he thought was a large fish coming to the ship and creating quite a wake; when it went underneath, he realized the torpedo had narrowly missed the ship!

Les James introduced him to Scottish Country dancing in the early 1960s, and he later danced with Betty Thompson. Over 50 years later, he still dances weekly, and in January he performed in two Robbie Burns' demonstrations at the Richmond Hill Curling Club and Richmond Hill Presbyterian Church. "It's my only social contact and the camaraderie is great," he says, "so if my breathing, hearing, and eyesight hold out, I'll continue – although it is hard to remember a dance when a briefer talks too much."

He was presented with a birthday cake and many good wishes from fellow dancers, among them Ella Allison, who also dances weekly and will celebrate her 91st birthday on April 3, and who danced 15 of the 16 dances on this year's Tartan Ball program.

"I sat out *Staffin Harvest* because I asked several people to dance and they were all too tired!" For these and other nonagenarians, Scottish country dance has positive mental, social, and physical attributes – H.I.S.C.D. at any age. Happy Birthday, Tom.

HOW THE TORONTO ASSOCIATION SPENDS YOUR MONEY

The RSCDS Toronto Association now has 375, including 27 new members since last September. All members pay a fee to join the branch (and fees have been creeping up) so the Board thought you'd like to know how your membership fees are spent. The pie charts below represent a breakdown of expenses for 2013. Chart A illustrates a general allocation of costs by category while pie charts B and C display details on specific expenses.

The total income of RSCDS Toronto for 2013 was \$107,000.

About 20 per cent of that was from membership fees while roughly 80 per cent was from various programs and classes. In addition, merchandise sales and honoraria received by the demo team brought in \$4300.

Board expenses are straightforward. However, we did introduce PayPal in 2013 to make it easier to pay your Membership, Workshop, and Tartan Ball tickets online. There was a fee of \$692 associated with this.

Chart A: We spent approximately \$100,000 last year so, as a rough guide, each per cent represents \$1000.

Some points to note:

- 'Publicity & Communications' includes \$3500 for printing, stationery and postage – \$2000 of this for Set & Link.
- The large amount for 'Catering' almost \$32,000 is due to last year's 50th Anniversary Tartan Ball which was attended by 400 people. The catering expense also includes the Tartan Ball facilities since the hotel includes the cost of the venue with the catering fee.
- It's worth highlighting that 75% of all expenditures go towards dancing – which is the whole point, of course. Events include Dancing in the Park, Monthly Dances, the Tartan Ball, the Toronto Workshop, youth events, Toronto Association classes, teacher candidate classes, and occasional ceilidhs.

Chart B looks specifically at Board expenses (\$8469 in 2013). **Chart C** shows how Scotland uses their funds (incl. our \$8000).

C: RSCDS SCOTLAND (THE SOCIETY) EXPENSES



We paid RSCDS headquarters in Edinburgh approximately \$8000 last year. This chart shows a breakdown of Scotland's expenses. The lion's share of their budget – 42 per cent – was spent on various 'schools' including the annual Summer School in St Andrews. Scotland tells us that 80 per cent of the schools' cost is paid by attendees (i.e., the fees don't cover the costs) but that their shop makes a profit.
