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m R}$ eels, reels, and more reels! Mirror reels? Check! Parallel reels? Check! Rightshoulder, left-shoulder? Check! Check! Across or down the line of dance? Another two checks!

It was like cramming for exams... Reel for four, reel for three, dancing couple starting in 1st. Triple check! Dancing couple starting in 2nd, facing down. Oh, no! Doesn't that turn everything downside up?

As we trace figure 8's - solo and in threes starting in 1st place, then 2nd, then 3rd, our teacher's calm but cheery voice provides constant reassurance. "Remember, you're always starting with your right foot!" And as she says so, Vicky

flashes a smile down at a bright orange spot taped to a fellow dancer's right shoe. Anything goes, as long as it does the trick. After all, isn't our aim to be collision-proof at the most important ball of the year?

With only three months of dancing experience in hand, I make the daring decision to go to my first Tartan Ball. For me, waiting an entire year until I'm more experienced is simply not an option. Miss out on all the pomp and circumstance? Never! What does it matter that a third of the dances feature reels of all shapes and sizes! Vicky Zeltins is holding three special sessions devoted to the 'reely' confusing world of dance. I'm confident this is something I shall master.



What's in a Name?



Ailsa Craig

T hough it's hardly breaking news, recently I noticed a news item, in the *New York Times* of all places, about the island of Ailsa Craig and the ongoing attempts of Archibald Kennedy, its owner, to sell it to anyone who cares to make an offer of more than a million and a half pounds sterling. It so happens that Archibald is not only a Scottish peer, the 8th Marquess of Ailsa, but he's also the hereditary Chief of Clan Kennedy.

As many will know, Ailsa Craig is a chunk of granite that juts forth from the waters of the Firth of Clyde to a height of over 1000 feet, about 10 miles west of the Ayrshire coast. Actually, it is the cone of a long-extinct volcano. My reason for selecting the now uninhabited Ailsa Craig for this article is that it is also the name of a strathspey devised over 40 years ago by one Eric Forbes for inclusion in the *Birmingham Book 1973*. Perhaps Mr. Forbes might be what Brits call colloquially a "brummie".

While I cannot recall ever having seen this dance on a program ... much less attempted to dance it ... maybe it merits fresh attention as a strathspey in celebration of the sport of curling. Why curling? Well, let's learn more about the island!

The geological formation of Ailsa Craig includes a very rare form of granite called riebeckite (aka "Ailsite") used to make curling stones. Enthusiastic curlers everywhere will likely recognize the name Kays of Scotland, a manufacturer of curling stones based in the town of Mauchline which lies between Ayr and Kilmarnock.

For many years, Lord Ailsa, the Marquess himself, leased parts of Ailsa Craig to Kays for the purpose of extracting the granite, shipping it to the mainland, and then turning it into curling stones. A few decades ago quarry blasting was disallowed and the extraction process became overly expensive. Within the same time frame, the island became a bird sanctuary and now its populated by thousands of gulls, gannets, kittiwakes, and other seabirds, under the aegis of the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds.

Even so, Kays' website still talks optimistically about ongoing negotiations with Lord Ailsa for the continued extraction of granite for future curling stone production. Ailsa Craig stones have been used in the last five Olympic Winter Games and are expected to be evident in the forthcoming Sochi Games.

Robbie Burns: Life Found in 200-Year-Old Records

The study of genealogy can lead to many different emotions: pride, surprise, pleasure, fascination, amusement, confusion, embarrassment, and regret are a few that come to mind.

There's a vast array of information sources such as official records like the census, and registrations of births, marriages, and deaths. The ones I find most engaging in my genealogy research are those that contain actual handwriting and signatures of long-gone family members or others.

The National Archives of Scotland holds a variety of such records. As an example, one can find several items that reveal different events in the life of Robbie Burns, some sad, some historical, and some defying the conventions of the day.

At the archives website (www.nas.gov.uk/about/090717.asp) under the heading *The Legacy of Robert Burns*, you can find a transcript of the birth record of Burns and see the actual handwriting of the minister in the parish record of Alloway.

I Praise the Dance* ...

I praise the dance, for it frees people from the heaviness of matter and binds the isolated to community. I praise the dance, which demands everything: health and a clear spirit and a buoyant soul. Dance is a transformation of space, of time, of people who are in constant danger of becoming all brain, will or feeling. Dancing demands a whole person, one who is firmly anchored in the centre of his life, who is not obsessed by lust for people and things, and the demon of isolation in his own ego. Dancing demands a freed person, one who vibrates with the equipoise of all his powers. I praise the dance, O man, learn to dance or else the angels in heaven will not know what to do with you.

In the transcript of the Mauchline kirk session minutes in 1786 is a record of Burns appearing before the kirk session composed of the minister and the elders (who were landowners and leading tenants) to admit his paternity of Jean Armour's twin children. A week earlier, Jean Armour had been summoned because she was pregnant and apparently unmarried. According to the minutes, she did not appear but sent a letter naming Robert Burns as the father. Here, again, one can



view the transcript in the actual handwriting of the recorder of the minutes and the actual words that Jean Armour used in her letter.

Another source is a letter written by Burns' supervisor John Mitchell, Collector of Excise in Dumfries. It is an account of Burns' trip to Dumfries to collect his exciseman salary, despite his failing health. He died one week later. Mitchell wrote, "reduced & shattered as he was, in the extreme, his Wit & Humour remained, as one instance, some of the officers, as he thought, looking at his Hat, says he, I believe there is no Stamp, in the Crown but pleads exemption, as being in quest of a Crown of Glory."

When we view these records, it is not hard to imagine the scenes that were taking place over two hundred years ago while the events were being chronicled by the writers of the minutes and letters.


