

## WHAT'S IN A DAME? BARRY PIPES REFLECTS ON A DIAMOND COLLECTION

hat, indeed! How about a slight change of pace in this issue of Set & Link? It's time for a mini-celebration for this monthly column, about which more will be said in a moment.

But first, since we don't all spend our evenings studying English Lit, let's identify the source of this well-known phrase. As many well know, it was penned, or should I say quilled, by the Bard quite some time ago. No, I don't mean Robbie, Scotland's very own Ayrshire Bard whose birthday we celebrated in January; this title refers to the Bard of Avon, Will Shakespeare by name. In his play *Romeo and Juliet* he put these words into the mouth of Juliet... "What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet." Juliet was referring to Romeo of course, and her unease had to do with his surname, Montague, whereas she was a Capulet. Romeo and Juliet



were the offspring of these feuding families. So, dear reader, if not before, now you know.

Celebration, did we say? Yes, indeed! It seems that we have now published 75 articles about the back-grounds of Scottish country dances. Dressed up with a bit of whimsy, and often with tongue in cheek, this labour of love has taken me about eight years. Labour of love? More Shakespeare? No, actually it's biblical, although Will did write a play called *Love's Labour's Lost*. At this point, God willing and with the blessings of the *Set & Link* committee, I am wondering whether I can stretch this out and, as cricketers might say, go for a century. This could take me at least another two and a half years or so, provided I do not "shuffle off this mortal coil" in the meanwhile. Aha! Shakespeare again, this time with just a little bit of Hamlet. And that's if I don't "lose my marbles" in the attempt. That phrase? Self explanatory perhaps. So, moving right along ...

With some trepidation, I submitted my first What's IN A NAME? back in November 2006. It covered the Perthshire mountain called Schiehallion, not forgetting those tricky reels with which we are all familiar. That was followed with that great partner-switching dance *The Bees of Maggieknockater*. Trepidation aside, I was now on a roll.

At the outset, I must humbly confirm that this concept was not initiated by me. In fact, it was the brain-child originally of the late Steve Coombs. But I believe he had to give up this *Set & Link* project when he was appointed Chair of RSCDS Toronto. As the names of Scottish country dances had always piqued my interest, I offered to take on the challenge of continuing Steve's work in the hope that I could sustain the project.

I am indebted to any number of RSCDS Toronto members who gave me both insights and encouragement. Not the least of them was veteran Scarborough dancer Roddy Nicoll, who, in his youth, raced mountain bicycles up and down the aforementioned Schiehallion mountain. In fact, in due course, I covered a dance named for Roddy, that self-same Dundonian cyclist. Devised by his daughter, RSCDS Toronto teacher Carole Skinner, it was called *The Dundee Wheeler*. (That is not a typo!)

More indebtedness? How about those many RSCDS members, not only in the Toronto area, but also wherever *Set & Link*'s circulation reaches, who have communicated with me to talk about What's IN A NAME? I am grateful for whatever feedback I can learn, and I thank you all for your interest and inspiration.

The Set & Link Committee has consistently supplied my column with great pictorial coverage, and my further gratitude goes wholeheartedly to Carole Bell and the members of her committee.

The question sometimes comes my way, "Did anyone ever devise a dance for you?" Well, truth be known! Yes! A few years ago, my previously mentioned friend Carole Skinner devised a dance called *Sir Barry Pipes*. This quirky name reflected, in jest, my supposed knighthood as a Petronella Social Group dancer and General Factotum. Going even further back, as a member of the Tartan Ball Committee in the 90s, I was treated to a dance called *The Poster Boy* by another prolific devisor, Ann Campbell. Although it is nowhere near as famous as Ann's *St Andrews of Brampton* or *The Dancing Bells*, I was thrilled nonetheless.

So, onwards and upwards! In striving to reach a target of 100 submissions, I've been contemplating a possible new name for this *Set & Link* column. Harking back to my opening words about Bards, maybe I should drop the Shakespeare and go with the Ayrshire Bard. Almost anagramatically speaking, how about "A Name's a Name for A'That"?

## The Gordons: Donald Holmes relates some oral history of our dancing past

## To watch us dance is to hear our hearts speak.

This Hopi Indian saying characterizes The Gay Gordons Scottish Men's Society that originated in Richmond Hill over 65 years ago.

Though the precise date of inception is unknown, this group had a vibrant life in the community for over forty years. As its name stipulates, and the times dictated, it was a group for men and men only. Women (wives that is) were allowed, or expected, to help with various activities. Initially, Scottish country dancing was only a minor part of the group's activities. One of its surviving members, Theo Hofmann

(now 91), told me, "Some of their other activities included lances, hellebardes (inset), shields, and other old symbols."

Bill Murray, a certificated Scottish dance teacher who also taught at Grace Church-on-the-Hill, eventually increased Scottish country dancing as a major activity of the group.

When Doris and Theo Hofmann joined the group, Doris and a couple of other women pushed for women to become full members. As a consequence, the Men's Scottish Society part of the name was dropped. The Group continued as The Gay Gordons. By the late 1960s, more change followed as Gay was dropped from the name for politically correct reasons. Interestingly, the group met the challenges forth-

rightly and thrived because of its adaptability. By the time the Hofmanns joined the group, anyone could join, but earlier admission had been restricted. The group held many parties in members' homes, but the official class of The Gordons in later years was held in Spring Garden School on Doncaster Avenue east of Yonge Street.

Within the group, two traditional annual events occurred. First, a Robbie Burns dinner complete with bagpipes, haggis, *An Address to the Haggis*, and a traditional lengthy toast to The Immortal Memory. The second annual event was a petrification of the past: a men's golf day. It was the sole remnant of the original Men's Society.

Beginning in Centennial year, Doris Hofmann, a Jean Millligan-certificated teacher, taught both The Gordons and the newly formed Richmond Hill dancers on alternative Friday nights for 23 years (1967 to 1990). For the Richmond Hill dancers, Theo was, in his words, "cashier and record keeper and general dogsbody". Doris was always very adventurous in her choice of dances. The Bees of Maggieknockater and Bratach Bàna were new dances and among her treasured Drewry choices. Theo continued by stating "The most interesting and difficult dances were always done at Doris' group in Richmond Hill." Favourites included Rob Roy by Hugh Foss, The Irish Rover by James Cosh, Drumelzier by Christopher Blair, and Highland Heather Honey, a square-set medley by Bill Forbes.

The Gordons' membership whom Theo retrieved "from old records and photographs" included Bill and Ada Murray, John and Marjorie Trew, Jeff and Joyce McLauchlan, Tom and Grace Knox, Bob and Helen McClare, Tom and Betty Rutherford, Jorgen and Betty Leffers, Wilf and Pearl Leek, Bill and Jean Cooper, Ian and Pauline Gilchrist, Tom and Betty Gorman, and Theo and Doris Hofmann (shown right, at Tartan Ball).

Three couples who attended the Richmond Hill dancers were Robin and Sharon Wood, Roddy and Frances Turner, and Douglas and Vera Worling. Vera said, "This was a small class, but it was well worth our drive from Aurora to meet the unusual challenges Doris always planned for us."

No matter the era, no matter the ame, there are shortcuts to happiness and


