



Barry F. J. Priddey: Dance Devisor, Artificer, Savant



Parry Frank James Priddey was born on July 28, 1928, in Birmingham, England, and became an accomplished musician, playing the oboe and *cor anglais* (English horn), in the Forces Regional Band while doing National Service in the Royal Air Force. Prior to this, he earned a BA degree at Birmingham University where he had also developed his musical skills, in addition to becoming fluent in Russian, French, and German. After completing his education and military service, he became a junior school teacher in Birmingham where he produced and directed plays for the children, and also made their costumes and scenery.

Barry became interested in Scottish country dancing in 1956 when he joined the Birmingham Branch of the RSCDS, and he soon demonstrated his keenness by gaining his teacher's certificate in 1961. He taught a class there from 1962 to 1970 when he moved to the Sutton Coldfield Branch where he served as treasurer and, apart from two short breaks, taught dances from 1980 until February 1996. As well as writing 14 books of dances, one of which he chose not to publish as it did not fully meet his exacting standards, he produced with the Lothian Band three LPs of SCD music. He designed and made a badge for Sutton Coldfield Branch together with some 20 shields

Director of E&T

Last spring, a new Board position, Director of Education and Training (E&T), was created. The E&T Director makes recommendations to the Board through the E&T Committee based on feedback from the dance community. The E&T Director liaises with the Teachers' Panel, TAC, TATA, and the Society's Education of the Community of the Com

Maureen Richardson tion and Training Staff.

With the help of an E&T Committee, education and training opportunities will be developed for dancers and teachers, designed to meet varying levels of ability. For example, events for young dancers will be tailored to their needs and interests, recognizing their importance to the organization. Of course, activities will be evaluated and revised as needed.

This E&T position also includes responsibilities in the planning of association classes; introductory and extension classes; special classes (like those held at Broadlands); teacher candidate classes; and activities such as Gala Day and the Youth Ball.

It takes scores of volunteers to make these events and activities successful. A key role of the E&T Director is to bring these people together so they can create a dance experience that is enjoyable and rewarding.

bearing Scottish dancing motifs which were used to ornament Sutton Coldfield Town Hall during the Branch's annual balls.

Having noticed the explosion of new Scottish country dances being devised around the world in the late 1960s and early 1970s, he collected the instructions for as many of these that he could, each typed on a separate sheet and kept in folders (these are now en route for retention in the archives at RSCDS Headquarters). With the help of musician and band leader George Meikle, not to mention the acquisition of a computer, he then gathered over 7000 dance details in a list which he published as *The Sutton Coldfield Index of Scottish Country Dances*. The index shows dance sources, bars of music, devisor, original tune, and composer. George Meikle and the Sutton Coldfield Branch have continued to maintain and update this huge list, which now references around 15,000 dances.

Barry was a highly intelligent man with a broad range of interests. His home was adorned with his own hand-worked tapestries, and he enjoyed his large range of ballet videos. Perhaps his greatest passion was for his Burmese cats, one of whom he sat up with into the small hours during her final minutes composing his Scottish country dance Farewell to Misty, a 32-bar strathspey for four couples depicting feline-like movements. It is included in his Capercaillie Book. He originated the Sutton Coldfield Weekend at Halsway Manor, Somerset, where some 40 dancers were invited to be taught his and other dances. This tradition has continued with George Meikle playing at all but one of the weekends, and with the minor change of location to The Paddocks at Ross on Wye, from then to now. Since his death on April 14, 1996, Sutton Coldfield Branch has also held an annual Barry Priddey Workshop to ensure that his dances are kept alive and regularly enjoyed. At the Tartan Ball in Toronto in February, 2015, we took pleasure in dancing his 32-bar jig for three couples, The Flight of the Falcon, with its alternating tandem reels.

What's in a Name? The City of Stirling Reel



In my view, anyone travelling to Scotland should make a point of spending a little time in and around Stirling. Easy to reach, being more or less equidistant from Glasgow or Edinburgh, the Stirling area is jam-packed with indications of Scottish history. It is of no surprise to me, therefore, that the late SCD devisor Roy Goldring would have devised a reel to celebrate the city and its environs.

Stirling's strategic position between upper and lower Scotland has led to it being described as "the brooch which clasps the Highlands and the Lowlands together". There has long existed a wealth of information about Stirling available to explorers of Scotland. So, rather than write yet another Stirling area travelogue about the Wallace Monument, the Bannockburn Battlefield, or the Bridge of Allan, I felt I should focus specifically on something that I have found particularly significant in my personal experiences with Stirling.

From the standpoint of military history alone, I would encourage visitors to climb the hilly streets up to Stirling Castle. Visitors will be treading on some pretty well enshrined ground as most of the castle's buildings date back to the 15th and 16th centuries. Mary, Queen of Scots, was one of several monarchs crowned there ...in her case, in 1542, prior to losing her head of course. The castle was besieged on a number of occasions, including in 1745 when Bonnie Prince Charlie led one of the besieging armies. Like many others, the siege failed. The castle is

also home base to one of Scotland's most famous regiments of yore, the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. Although now part of the Royal Regiment of Scotland, this storied unit has a memorable museum on the premises.

Who remembers that Brit film released in 1960 called *Tunes of Glory*? It featured Alec Guinness and John Mills and much of the movie was filmed at Stirling Castle. I vaguely recall that the film even included a scene in which the officers were discussing what type of Scots bonnet should be worn for the occasion. Remember my Scots Bonnet column last month about distinguishing between Glengarries and Balmorals?



A number of years ago, my wife Kathryn and I experienced a memorable moment. We were high up on the castle battlements. It was quite an unsettled day weatherwise, and what did we see across the valley but the William Wallace Monument. It was surrounded above by the arc of a magnificent rainbow. A glorious moment that we will always remember!

The next time you decide to visit Scotland, do yourself a favour and check out this most interesting city. You'll not regret it!
