From the Chair...



s you read this edition of Set & Link, Keith and I shall be on vacation in Scotland. Our journey north to Inverness takes us through the Drumochter Pass and the valley of the Spey, in Invernesshire. We drive

past Dalwhinnie whisky distillery (which draws water from a high spring near the head of the pass). We then descend into the valley of the river Spey, which flows north to the Moray Firth, passing many distilleries! From Inverness we travel to the Isle of Harris in the Outer Hebrides to a hotel which has a very wide range of single malt whiskies, much to Keith's delight.

Strathspey, of course, is also a dance tempo. Although the name comes from the river, the music does not. Recent research has revealed that the music originated in Gaelic tunes which came from the Outer Isles in the 5th and 6th centuries. This was the time of St Columba on Iona. He travelled to Inverness to visit the Pictish King Brude. Travelling along Loch Ness side it is said that Columba came across the monster — the first recorded sighting!

From the Hebrides we travel to Perth to attend the RSCDS AGM, held the first weekend in November each year. The RSCDS has been developing a Strategic Plan and consulting the Branches, including Toronto, for feedback. The AGM weekend includes a question and answer session on the next stage, which we shall attend. This is a wonderful opportunity to meet other dancers from all over the world and to exchange ideas.

Nearer home, there are all kinds of exciting events coming up. There is a series of Sunday classes at Broadlands Community Centre and the Workshop on Saturday, November 12. We have three top teachers for the workshop and also a special class on Friday evening taught by Linda Henderson.

From October 2014 to April 2015, the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa put on an exhibit examining the contributions women made through working, volunteering, and serving in uniform in the military (more than 50,000) during both World Wars. Using a variety of artifacts and media, the exhibit examined the personal stories of the women associated with the materials. One contributor to the project was Barbara McNutt, a long-time dancer in various Toronto Association groups. The following is her recollection of her war effort as reported to the Canadian War Museum.



When World War II started, I was six years old, living in Dartmouth,
Nova Scotia. The large estate between our house and Halifax
Harbour was turned into an army camp, usually occupied by
highland regiments with their kilts and pipe bands — which were
more welcome than noisy Bren gun carriers on the street at 3 a.m.
We could hear riveters at the shipyard 24 hours a day, and see ships
moving up the harbour to anchor in Bedford Basin, waiting to cross
the Atlantic.

My father added to his work as an accountant with Imperial Oil by becoming manager of the British Petroleum Board's Shuttle Operation, receiving neutral tankers from South America, unloading oil to storage tanks, then reloading it onto British tankers to await a convoy.

My mother, like the others I knew, did volunteer work – knitting socks, cooking Sunday dinners to entertain sailors on day leave, organizing rummage sales and tag days, working shifts at the Dartmouth Canteen for Servicemen.

As a child, I went door to door with others, collecting solidified kitchen fat and metal for salvage. Once we wrote and performed a variety show to raise money for the Queen's Canadian Fund. Financially, it was not very successful but later my mother told me it was hilarious – my major speech in the play began, "I am a weed."

There were tag days many Saturdays to raise funds for specific projects, but you had to be 12 years old to handle money. A similar program involved teenage "Miss Canada" girls going door to door EVERY Saturday selling War Savings Stamps. A 25-cent stamp was the smallest denomination of loan to the government in the series of Savings Bonds and certificates. Sixteen stamps pasted in a folder – worth \$4 – would entitle you to an eventual return of \$5.

Two of my older friends had a neighbourhood route where they sold \$10 worth every Saturday. Just as

I turned 12 they had a chance to move to one with double the sales, so my friend and I were conscripted to replace them. We were issued the red Miss Canada apron with pockets for stamps and money, and the blue wedge cap. We soon learned that some peo-



ple were never home or never bought, so we'd just call on our regular customers, though some bought only one stamp per week. Mary Ann's aunt lived at the halfway point, where her warm kitchen and cup of cocoa were welcome on cold winter days.

The enamelled silver pin was not standard issue, but an award. We were never able to increase sales so it must have been for turning up dependably. There were a few times when we rushed from house to house then tore across town to do the older girls' route for an additional \$20. I remember details of other tag days when we must have "worked the second shift".

Raising money to help win the war was a very responsible job, and we took it seriously.



#88 What's in a Name?

Thanks to two of the admirable teachers whose classes I attend (hello Maureen, you too, Jess), I have managed to get my mind around what to me is yet another previously unknown dance. Ezekiel's Wheel is an 88-bar reel in a square set formation. Those of you who may be biblically inclined will remember that the Book of the Prophet Ezekiel can be found in the Old Testament, between the Books of Lamentations and

Daniel. The Hebrew name Ezekiel translates into "May God Strengthen Him." It is written that he was born circa 622 BCE in Jerusalem and died in Babylon in 570 BCE. Although a Hebrew, his status as a prophet is well recognized within not only Christianity, but also the Islamic religion.

At this point in time, I think that the name Ezekiel is somewhat archaic. Go back a century or so, however, and one would have found no end of Ezekiels, especially within those geographic areas of what we tend to call Bible Belts to the south of us. More often than not, the abbreviated name Zeke was used. The only person named Ezekiel that comes to my mind right now is a Latino baseball player for the Toronto Blue Jays called Ezequiel (Spanish version) Carrera. That Zeke is a 29-year-old Venezuelan who is achieving some success in the current Major League Baseball play-offs. How's that for something coming out of left field — the position that Carrera plays!

But what's this about a "Wheel"? Well, it is recorded that Ezekiel, being a prophet, had a vision complicated enough that this is hardly the space in which to attempt explaining it in detail. As best as I can remember, there were actually two wheels at issue. That said, you can always look it up!

I do recall that there exists an old folk song on the subject, which starts along the lines of ... "Ezekiel saw a wheel a-turnin, way up in the air; a wheel within a wheel a-turnin, way up in the air. For those interested in folk music, it was recorded by American singer/songwriter Woody Guthrie, who was even more well-known for a song that I believe we all remember: This Land Is Your Land. For the record, Ezekiel's Wheel was also recorded by numerous other folk singers,

plus both country singer Johnny Cash and jazz singer/trumpeter Louis Armstrong. From personal experience, moreover, it was listed among the many campfire songs covered by the Boy Scout organization. Likely, the Girl Guides too!

It is guite a long trek from a recorded biblical event more than 1500 years ago to a Scottish country dance, so how did that come to pass? The devisor of the dance is James Mungall, who hails from Louisiana. He is a member of The Caledonian Society of Baton Rouge, and, no surprise here, is an English teacher at the Baton Rouge Christian Life Academy. Personally, I am rather partial to square set dances, and find Ezekiel's Wheel quite enjoyable, especially with its Double Celtic Reels followed quickly by Schiehallion Reels. At the same time, a reading of the Strathspey Server on-line indicates that folks in some SCD groups are not happy with the slip-stepping across the set that follows, between the first and third couples, then the second and fourth, and instead add other formations in lieu of the slip-stepping. In response to which, Mr. Mungall said, in part, "I'm glad it worked for y'all".

Be that as it may, this dance certainly appeals to me. Maybe it might be worthwhile programming it a bit more often.

In September 1966 I traded my Nehru jacket and Beatle boots for a tartan

blazer and a pair of broques. I was asked to play with Stan Hamilton & The Flying Scotsmen! Thus began my 50-year journey and love affair with Scottish country dance

From somewhat terrifying but extremely exciting beginnings, I travelled down this wonderful road playing bass with Stan for many years and then bass and piano and occa-

sionally guitar and 2nd accordion with my dear friend, Bobby Brown, until his death in 2011. While I periodically took sabbaticals, venturing into country, blues and folk genres, I continued on the path Stan started me on all those years ago.

I've played for festivals, concerts, dances, and workshops from Alaska to L.A., from Halifax to Miami and all points in between in venues like Roy Thomson Hall, Massey Hall, the Royal Alexandra Theatre, Maple Leaf Gardens, and of course Crescent School, just to name a few. I even managed a tour of Scotland once.



I've shared the stage with some of the musical greats such as Andy Stewart, Moira Anderson, Calum Kennedy, Vera Lynn, the Alexander Brothers, Will Starr, the Irish Rovers, Billy Connelly, and the great George Jones (yes, that George Jones). Rubbing shoulders with music icons such as these is indeed heady stuff and has given me some fabulous memories, which I will always cherish. But the thing that has kept me going, kept me involved all this time



Most monthly dances have two designated briefed only dances (excluding, of course, Family Night in December and Beginners Night in March). What's this about?



Did you know?

- ◆ During WWI, to raise money for prisoners of war, Ottawa Women's Canadian Club sold souvenirs made from the debris of the Centre Block of Parliament, which had burned down in 1916.
- ♦ During WWII, women and girls sold 25-cent War Savings Stamps. By the end of the program, they had raised \$318 million.
- ◆ More than 50,000 women served with the Canadian Armed Forces during the two World Wars.
- ♦ Molly Lamb Bobak was the only female Canadian war artist sent overseas during WWII – and was one of Canada's most celebrated.
